Given that the majority of the building either has roo•ights or is open the poten•al for it to support bats is reduced although their presence is always possible. There is s•II poten•al for nes•ng birds to be present however and there is no ecological informa•on submi•ed on this therefore should permission be granted I would recommend a•achment of the Ecology condi•ons and informa•ves below.

Nes•ng birds

Prior to the commencement of the works hereby approved a nes•ng bird survey shall be carried out of the site, and the results, along with details of any necessary mi•ga•on and working methods required, submi•ed to the Local Planning Authority for approval.

Reason: To ensure that the development does not cause harm to any protected or priority species or their habitats in accordance with Policy ESD10 of the Cherwell Local Plan 2011-2031 Part 1 and Government guidance contained within the Na•onal Planning Policy Framework.

Biodiversity Enhancement

Prior to commencement of the development hereby approved a method statement for enhancing biodiversity on site shall be submi•ed to and approved in wri•ng by the Local Planning Authority. Therea•er, the biodiversity enhancement measures approved shall be carried out prior to occupa•on and retained in accordance with the approved details.

Reason: To ensure an overall gain for biodiversity results from the development in accordance with Policy ESD10 of the Cherwell Local Plan 2011-2031 Part 1 and Government guidance contained within the Na•onal Planning Policy Framework.

Bats

Bats are a highly mobile species which move between a number of roosts throughout the year. Therefore all works must proceed with cau•on and should any bats be found during the course of works all ac•vity in that area must cease un•l a bat consultant has been contacted for advice on how to proceed. Under the Wildlife & Countryside Act 1981 (as amended) and the Habitat and Species Regula•ons 2010 it is illegal to inten•onally or recklessly disturb, harm or kill bats or destroy their res•ng places.
