I strongly object to Oxford United building a new stadium, conference centre, hotel, shop, bar and gym for the following reasons.

- 1. From the plans submi ed this is a massive over development of the available land which will have a very nega•ve e•ect on everyone living in the surrounding area.
- 2. There is totally inadequate parking facili es available for a development of this size. People using the stadium and other facili es will inundate all available parking at Council car parks, Sainsbury's, Stra eield Brake, the park and rides and train sta eon. Any overeow or people wishing to park for free will park in Kidlington, parecularly Garden City. Indeed Grenoble Road is used on match days as a linear car park to the already exiseng car park at the Kassam Stadium so I am sure a similar fate will fall upon Frieze Way with terrifying safety implica ons. At some point in the future there will be an introducon of a residents parking zone, the cost of which will fall upon the residents annually to enable them to park outside their own homes!
- 3. Much has been made of the sites close proximity to an exis•ng railway sta•on which will be of limited use for home fans in and around Oxford City who will have to make split mode journeys to reach football games at the site. Indeed there was much talk of a new sta•on in Cowley but a business case could not be made as there was no demand for rail travel by a•endees at the football games. There is no compunc•on for people to travel by bus or train indeed it would be cheaper and easier for them to use their cars. Indeed if parking near schools are anything to go by the council and or police are powerless and it is local people who will su•er the consequences so that a privately owned football club can enrich itself.
- 4. Garden City, Stra •ield Brake, parts of Yarnton and Kidlington are already very prone to •ooding because of rainwater run o• overwhelming current drainage. The building of this vast complex on land that already •oods and is part of the •ood plain will only exacerbate the problem. One only needs to look at the extension of the Park and Ride at Seacourt built on a •ood plain and now regularly •oods to see poten•al issues. Indeed the drainage provided by Thames Water is totally inadequate in this area now and that is before all the planned houses are built in the Kidlington, Begbroke, Yarnton area. Thames Water at a recent planning mee•ng said they would supply water to these developments but cannot provide adequate waste facili•es. In the area Thames Water already posi•ons tankers 24 hours a day 7 days a week to pump and dispose of waste that cannot be accommodated and disposed of through their pipes. Indeed our streams, back gardens and in some cases houses are being •ooded at record levels and un•l the issue of drainage and waste disposal is addressed so that local people's health is not jeopardised planning must be refused.
- 5. People working or visi•ng Kidlington, London or Oxford will poten•ally not be able to •nd parking at the train sta•on or park and rides because of people using the hotel, gym or stadium so their commute will become even more fraught than it already is. This infrastructure was built for the use of local people to enable them to get to work, visit, or crucially go to the Oxford Hospitals. The use of these park and rides sites will be crucial, when all these planned housing developments to ful•I Oxfords unmet housing need are built to enable people to access work medical, and leisure facili•es in Oxford or London. No main road should be closed to bene•t a few football supporters when the impact would be chaos for everyone else.

5. Oxford United already have a stadium that is less than 25 years old and their proposed move to a new eco stadium is not environmentally friendly in fact quite the reverse. Their reasons for moving are shrouded in secrecy and they have been shown •me and •me again to be very economical with the truth. The clubs •nances are woeful and they have reported losses of millions of pounds just last week. The owners hail from Thailand and at a moments no •ce could withdraw their subsidies, who then picks up the bills?
