

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- 500,000 visitors a year to this vast private enterprise an estimated 60% larger floorspace than Bicester Village.
- A 4 storey, 500 family room hotel = more than 2,000 visitors daily capacity.
- Minimum 1800+ additional car movements daily on already congested roads including the A34, A41, A4095, and B430, affecting Bicester.
- · An 84ft high water tower building (likely to be the tallest building in Cherwell) and 900 space car park.
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- A substantial increase in air and noise pollution.
- The proposed 600 job opportunities will overstretch the local job market and the established hospitality industry, already struggling to recruit staff.
- Disruption of village lifestyle for thousands of residents in Chesterton and neighbouring villages.
- A self-contained resort. 98% of guest in the USA remain on site. Therefore, it is of no real economic benefit to the local community.
- . Day passes very expensive, dependent upon hotel occupancy and would need to be booked well in advance. This will NOT be a public amenity!
- It is unsustainable our village infrastructures would not cope with the additional traffic through Chesterton, Weston on the Green & Middleton Stoney.
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- Irreversible damage to our rural community, felt for generations to come.

This application is not in accordance with the Cherwell Local Development Plan. There is no 'need' for this development and there are no material considerations that should warrant planning permission being granted.

I whole-heartedly object to this application for a large-scale water theme park in the small village of Chesterton. There is absolutely no need for such a development in this location.

This is currently a stunning greenfield site providing a healthy sporting facility, which will be lost to a vast, inappropriately sized concreted area with large uncharacteristic buildings for a small village. The 900-space car park indicates the anticipated huge volume of extra traffic that will be travelling to and from the site, bringing with it a substantial increase in noise pollution, not to mention a decrease in air quality and the potentially adding to the associated health issues currently being identified nationally.

This will be a private resort attracting a proposed 500,000 visitors, and their vehicles, annually into an area already suffering from severe traffic congestion issues on the M40, A34, A41, A4095 and B430. The infrastructure of the area will simply not be able to sustain this proposed development, to the detriment of thousands of local residents and businesses. The conference facilities will also attract an unknown but substantial extra number of car movements and resulting congestion.

Economically, the development will provide very little benefit to the local area, which already has very low unemployment. It's requirement to employ 600 lower skilled staff will either attract employees away from existing local businesses (already struggling to find staff) or necessitate distanced new employees travelling into the site, thereby increasing car journeys further. (There is no provision for staff accommodation on site). These low-skilled employment opportunities are also contrary to Cherwell's strategic aim of prioritising knowledge-based investment as a priority

This resort will not be open to the public. The possibility of being offered expensive day passes will be solely dependent upon poor hotel occupancy, which is obviously not in the developers' plans! As the majority of guests are encouraged to stay and spend their money on site, there will be negligible economic benefit to the local hospitality industry.

Once again, I strongly object to this unwanted and unneeded proposal, completely out of keeping with its rural location, and ask that it be refused.

I am a resident of Weston on the Green and will personally be impacted by the development of this resort. I strongly object to this application. The proposal is not in accordance with the Local Development Plan and there are no material considerations that would warrant planning permission being granted. There are several areas that concern me: Traffic The existing road infrastructure (and that of surrounding villages) can't cope with the extra 1000+ daily increase in traffic volume, plus construction traffic. Weston on the Green is already a 'rat-run' and experiences major traffic congestion as an escape route during the many traffic issues on M40 or A34. Unacceptable routing plans via already stressed routes ie. Middleton Stoney, Weston on the Green + Wendlebury. This proposal would also direct traffic onto the A34 which already encounters significant traffic problems. It adds to numerous other significant proposals that have been approved in Bicester recently (Kingsmere, Bicester Gateway, Bicester Heritage). The road networks cannot cope with this additional traffic and the proposal is in the wrong location. Construction traffic will be intolerable and significant in volume Goods and services deliveries will involve large vehicles and will probably travel during the night which will be unacceptable to our quiet villages Lack of Economic Benefits for Cherwell and Local Area This proposal is contrary to Cherwell's strategic aim of prioritising Knowledge Based business investment as a priority, thereby offering employment supporting the 'Knowledge Economy'. Hotel rooms only available to Great Wolf resort guests. This does not assist the growth of other businesses in the areas providing employees with a place to stay overnight. No local businesses support the scheme to reinforce Great Wolf's suggestions of economic benefits. Great Wolf aims to keep all guests on site to use their restaurants, bowling alleys, retail shops etc so economic benefits retained by Great Wolf and not shared with local businesses in the local area. Local businesses are already finding it hard to recruit the employees Great Wolf will be targeting. As such, Great Wolf will either take employees away from local businesses thus having a negative economic impact, or they will bring in employment from other areas therefore increasing traffic movements. Design The building is a 3 & 4 storey design, massive in size. It has been difficult to imagine the actual size of the building but it has been likened to an Ikea superstore. The buildings and car parking have spread across the site having significant urbanising impact on this rural location. Both the design and the size are inappropriate on a greenfield site, in the countryside where there is no local demand for such a facility. This scheme comprises of a total floor area of 500,000 sq. ft in two/three overbearing large blocks, not in-keeping with the local area. Schemes in such a location should be of small scale, detached buildings at low height (similar to the existing Golf Club), enhancing the character of the local area as outlined in Cherwell Council's Countryside Design Summary. Air/Noise Pollution/Quality/Water table Public outdoor space on site will be right next to motorway (unhealthy due to noise and fumes)? Resultant deterioration in air quality and noise pollution from additional traffic, construction and service vehicles is of grave concern to me light pollution throughout the night will cast a glow on the sky, masking the night sky and having an negative effective on night insects and animals An enormous amount of water will be used from Cherwell's already short supply, drainage of water treated with chemical could pollute our system (note: Thames Water consultation response). Cherwell's own consultant (Tyrens) refers to the need to "reduce water demand in this highly water stressed area". Thames Water Report supports only 50 of the 500 rooms from the existing water

supply. How will the huge use of water affect Weston on the Green? We don't know because a study has not yet been done. Health Care Resources in the Bicester area are already stretched and planning for increased medical services is problematic given the shortage of Surgeries and GP Practitioners. I await a response from the Health Services on this topic. To my knowledge, Wolf Resorts has not planned a medical facility on site. Conclusion To be frank, I cannot see one good reason for this application to be approved. It fails on so many levels but fundamentally it is the wrong design in the wrong location. Re: Great Lakes UK Ltd - Planning Application No: 19/02550/F. I am a resident of Westonon-the-Green. I object to this application. The proposed development is not in accordance with the local development plan. It will cause significant detriment to surrounding areas with no clear benefit. The main causes of concern are: 1) Traffic and road safety: the application includes the need for a 900-space car park indicating that Great Lakes recognises that the majority of their customers will travel by car. Chesterton's road networks are insufficient for the proposed volume of traffic. Great Lakes stated in an open meeting that they will encourage customers and construction vehicles to travel from the M40 to the A34 and approach Chesterton through the surrounding villages, including the B430 in Weston-on-the-Green. The A34 already has significant traffic problems and cannot cope with increased traffic volume. Weston-on-the-Green is a small village with narrow roads, few sidewalks, no cycle lanes and young families. We already get run off from the A34; increasing this traffic is unacceptable. It puts our children at great risk of road traffic accidents as well as the many cyclists we have on our roads. The quality of our roads already suffers from the volume of traffic we have; increasing this, especially with added heavy goods vehicles, will worsen this and provide additional risk to local traffic and cyclists. I am not prepared to accept this risk to my child and family. I understand that the mitigation proposal involves two-hourly shuttle buses from the Bicester stations. These bear no relation to train times and clearly their customers are unlikely to wait this length of time for buses. The fact that they need such a large car park and so few buses indicates that they recognise that these are unlikely to be used. 2) Pollution: this application will result in air, water, noise and light pollution. Increased traffic will negatively impact on air quality; I can see no assessment of this impact for Weston-on-the-Green in the application despite the fact that Great Lakes has stated it will advise customers to use the village as one of the routes to the site. This is an unacceptable health risk in a village full of children and older people. The traffic, as well as the development itself, will also result in increased noise and light pollution which are of great concern to those of us living in a rural village due to its impact on our local wildlife. The potential for water pollution is not addressed despite the fact that this development will have water features. How is the water from these treated and what is the potential for chemical run off into the environment? How will the significant amount of effluent be treated and managed? None of this is given full consideration in this green land area. 3) Water usage: Cherwell is known to be an area of water stress (Cherwell Policy ESD 3). This development involves both a water park and a large residential building. In this application there has not been a full assessment of the impact of the water consumption for both a water park and a hotel on the water-stressed surrounding villages. The Thames Water Report supports only 50 of the 500 rooms from the existing water supply. The concerns around this appear to have been dismissed by Great Lakes who state that they feel that the increase in demand will be negligible on local supply despite not having completed a full study. This indicates their cavalier attitude to such a significant local and environmental concern. This is unsustainable and unacceptable. 4) Environmental impact and carbon footprint: the above points indicate the potential for significant environmental concern. Alongside these concerns I cannot see an impact assessment on local and surrounding area wildlife and biodiversity which is of key concern in this greenbelt. Neither is there an obvious comprehensive environmental policy statement or carbon offset plan. How is this acceptable given our current concerns? If they do have such plans, why are these not clearly highlighted throughout this application? I can only conclude that this is not of real importance to the plans of Great Lakes, and even should something be added in retrospect I would have serious doubts about their

environmental commitment. The rationale that Great Lakes gives for this development is

that it will increase local employment and provide local economic benefit. We currently have a number of hospitality businesses in the local area. These struggle to recruit local employees, therefore I can only conclude that Great Lakes plans to recruit out of the area. We already struggle with local affordable housing and GP services. If labour is brought in from other areas how will these be addressed? If this is meant to be transient labour then this provides no real local benefit and places greater burden on travel infrastructure. Great Lakes is a closed resort with resident facilities including restaurants and retail. How does this support local and surrounding small businesses? The only economic benefit that can be found is to Great Lakes itself. Based on the above and given the lack of consultation with Cherwell and the local development plan I object to and oppose this planning application.

RE: Great Lakes UK Ltd., Planning Application No: 19/02550/F I am referring to the respective application for the construction of a 500 room hotel and water park in the neighbouring village of Chesterton. I am a resident of Weston on the Green. I object to this application, there is no commercial or sustainable argument for this development in this area. The main points are detailed as follows: 1. Traffic and Road infrastructure: The application stated the requirement for a 900 space care park, indicating that Great Lakes acknowledges that most of their business will travel from out of area via car or other road vehicle. Chesterton is a small village with no ability to deal with the volume of traffic. The application further states that customers will be encouraged to use access from the M40 and the A34. This seriously impacts on the safely of the local villages. They already deal with run off from the A34 and M40. There is insufficient pedestrian access and the roads are not able to tolerate the increase traffic as there is already a demonstrable issue with the overflow it currently holds. The danger to life is further exacerbated by the expectation that traffic will peak in the summer period when children and families are at home. 2. Water Sustainability: It is noted that the Cherwell area already an area of Water Stress (please refer to Cherwell Policy ESD3). The Hotel alone will dramatically increase the demand on this water. Now include a Water Park this is an intolerable demand to the local area for bother residents and wildlife. I see no acknowledgement of this from the application, in fact there isn't an environmental policy. This suggests to me that this has not been considered by Great Lakes Ltd and shows negligence. 3. Environmental impact: Relating to the lack of a formal Environmental policy. Is it totally absurd to considered a development of this nature in a green belt region with a significant wildlife population. If this was a concern for Great Lakes Ltd there would be evidence through clear assessment and policy. I am a local employer and know that Bicester has a very low unemployment rate due to the significant Bicester Village development and hospitality sites. Therefore employment will likely come from out of the area. This will not benefit the local area and will further place demand on the local road

network and other local small businesses. I would at the least expect to see elements of training and support for retraining. This is another example of what is an arrogant, ill-

I refer to the captioned application for the construction of a 500-room hotel and water-park resort in Chesterton under the management of Great Wolf Resorts Limited. I am a resident of Weston on the Green.

I strongly object to this application. There are three fundamental concerns about this project as it relates to Weston on the Green. They are:

- 1) Traffic and air quality;
- Water quantity and quality;
- Light pollution.

1) Traffic and Air Quality:

The applicant acknowledges the existing road network in Chesterton is inadequate to meet the potential demands for vehicular access to the site during both the construction and operational phases. The Chesterton road system is too narrow. The forecast volume of traffic using the existing road system will represent a danger to motorists, cyclists and pedestrians. This inadequacy is acknowledged by Great Lakes UK Ltd. in their application and in their public meetings.

The supposed mitigation measures contained in the document "Framework Travel Plan for Great Lakes UK Limited" are subject to certain caveats:

 "Following occupation of the development a baseline travel survey will be undertaken to establish, in particular, a baseline mode share for staff and guests......". Surely this type of information was used in their original location assessment. How did they determine a need for a 900-space car park?

- The assumption is customers will abide by Great Lake UK Ltd's formal travel plan rather than automobiles. Modern travel patterns do not support this contention.
- They are ignoring how the GPS navigation system directs people to the location, which is through Chesterton.

The mitigation proposal involves using shuttle buses to meet staff and customers at either the Bicester North or Bicester Village rail stations. The supporting maps show the routing of the shuttle buses use the streets of Chesterton for access to the site. The applicant intends to use a two-hourly cycle for the shuttle buses, which bears little relation to train frequency. People will not be prepared to wait for extended periods of time for a shuttle bus.

A 900-space car park implies Great Lakes UK Ltd already know how the overwhelming majority of their customers will commute to the site.

These concerns about traffic through Chesterton were raised at public meetings. Great Lakes UK Ltd's response was they will encourage clients to exit the M40 at junction 9 to the A34 and then the B430 through Weston on the Green. This routing will also apply to HGV's during the construction phase. There are two fundamental problems with this proposal:

First, the A34 at Junction 9, in both directions is at full capacity most times of the day. This encouragement will only add to the burden on that artery. The extensive planned housing developments in Oxford, Bicester and elsewhere in the A34 corridor renders this proposal unsustainable. Simply put the infrastructure is lacking.

Second, Cherwell District Council is aware Weston on the Green is in the final phases for approving its Neighbourhood Plan. Part of the Plan responds to the villagers' concerns about vehicle volumes, noise, speed and air quality on traffic presently using the B430. The Parish Council has an active sub committee seeking to implement various measures to calm the traffic flowing through the village. This is a very serious and legitimate concern.

In their air quality report there is no assessment of the potential impact on the air quality in Weston on the Green. I find it disturbing that Cherwell District Council has not set up a baseline monitoring point at Weston on the Green in response to Great Lake UK Ltd's pre-application submissions. The current application implies the impact at Middleton Stoney monitoring point is negligible. This may be true because the applicant is recommending its customers and contractors should approach the site from Weston on the Green.

Weston on the Green is used as an escape route in the event of traffic congestion on both the A34 and the M40. The proposed routing will only add to the burden on the village road system and cause further deterioration of air quality.

In the application it is stated that the project proponent is awaiting a response from Cherwell on its energy strategy. Will this strategy address the issues of carbon footprint, climate change and air quality? This is a prerequisite before any decision can be rendered.

2) Water Quantity and Quality:

I note Cherwell District Council's water consultant, Tyrens, has stated there is a necessity "to reduce water demand in this highly water stressed area." Cherwell's Policy ESD 3 states "Cherwell District is in an area of water stress." The proposal seeks to increase the "draw" on resources from 1,596,000 litres per annum to 192,600,000 litres per annum before any mitigation measures. This figure has now been reduced to 141,512,00 litres per annum. Even this lower figure is a huge increase in water demand. The measures cited by Great Lakes UK Ltd to reduce this consumption are deceptive because they are the industry norms, not unique. The 141,512,000 litres should be the baseline.

Thames Water indicated the present capacity is sufficient for 50 of the 500 rooms. What about Thames Water's ability to service the water park features of the project? I have to conclude their response relates solely to the hotel segment of the project. Thames Water has suggested they undertake a modeling study, which will take 18 months from the time of commissioning the study. Great Lakes UK Ltd's application document contains the following statement:

"Once the identified remedial works have been carried out, the sensitivity of the capacity of Thames Water's cold water infrastructure network can be considered low and the magnitude of change post mitigation is considered negligible. Therefore, there is likely to be a negligible residual effect on the Thames Water mains cold water infrastructure network (not significant) following the implementation of mitigation measures. The resource requirement will however remain significant (i.e. circa 141,512,000 litres per annum)."

In the Summary of Residual Effects the 88.7-fold increase in demand is deemed to be negligible before we have the results of the Thames Water study. On what basis has this conclusion been made? I am concerned about the impact of such water consumption and sourcing on the area surrounding Chesterton. Where will the water come from? The application deals with the consumption issue in isolation and does not take into account the extensive residential development in a "water stressed area". I contend the issue of water quantity makes this application unsustainable.

I am also concerned that the water table at the site is 250mm below the surface and it is not clear if any assessment has been made about the impact of a project of this magnitude will have on the immediate and surrounding water table in an area of water stress.

Referring to the issue of water quality I am amazed that the management company, Great Wolf Resorts Limited, does not have a comprehensive environmental policy statement. Surely a company reliant on clean fresh water must have an agreed policy applicable to its many corporate ventures. At the very least it could provide a

benchmark to assess the company's performance in other jurisdictions. It is not clear from the documents I have seen how the company recycles water, treats effluent and reduces its discharge of waste water, other than a passing reference to the use of grey water. How is the water in the water features treated and discharged? This is extremely important when the water table is so near the surface. An analysis of the extent of the water table beyond the immediate site should be made to determine the potential impact on adjacent communities.

I think one of the fundamental questions Cherwell District Council must ask is what is Great Wolf Resorts Limited's track record in its other resorts. The question needs to be asked to both the equivalent of district councils and local residents.

The absence of an environment policy statement should raise questions about the company's policies on plastic use, carbon footprint issues and carbon-offset policy. Where is the corporate commitment to the environment?

3) Light Pollution:

It is difficult to assess from the application what the impact of the lighting of the operational project will have on Weston on the Green. But I note that throughout the documentation there is a constant reference to a four-storey hotel on the site. Yet in the document entitled "Illumination Impact Profile, November 2019, the illustration only shows a two-story structure. Why?

Where is the assessment data for the tower housing the water features? This may well prove to be an eyesore not only for residents of Chesterton, but also surrounding communities. I am concerned about the reflection of the lighting on clouds in the sky and what the possible impact may be on residents living in dark villages such as Weston on the Green.

I am opposed to this application because it is basically an unsustainable proposal on the edge of a small community, which will have adverse effects on surrounding rural communities.



I wish to strongly object to the above-mentioned application on the grounds that this proposal is not in accordance with the local development plan.

It is unsustainable, in an inappropriate location on the edge of a small historic village. The development includes a 900-space car park, indicating a significant reliance on car travel which goes against the Cherwell Strategy of reducing car usage. It will comprise 500,000 square feet of building on a greenfield site, irreversibly removing important green space and disrupting ecological habitats for an abundance of wildlife. The design of the buildings is neither small scale nor detached and therefore not in keeping with the character of the local area.

The existing road infrastructure cannot cope with the projected extra 1000+ daily car movements. Chesterton is already a 'rat-run' and experiences major congestion as an escape route during the many traffic issues on the M40 and A34. In addition to several other significant proposals approved in Bicester, its unacceptable routing plans via Middleton Stoney, Weston on the Green and Wendlebury, will seriously affect the already stressed A34, A41, A4095 and B430. This will also result in a significant deterioration in air quality and a substantial increase in noise pollution for local residents.

Local businesses are already finding it difficult to recruit the employees Great Wolf will be targeting. As such, they will either take employees away from local businesses - a negative economic impact, or they will bring in employment from other areas, thereby increasing traffic movements. This will be a private resort attracting a proposed 500,000 visitors, and their vehicles, annually into an area already suffering from severe traffic congestion issues on the M40, A34, A41, A4095 and B430. The infrastructure of the area will simply not be able to sustain this proposed development, to the detriment of thousands of local residents and businesses. The conference facilities will also attract an unknown but substantial extra number of car movements and resulting congestion.

Economically, the development will provide very little benefit to the local area, which already has very low unemployment. It's requirement to employ 600 lower skilled staff will either attract employees away from existing local businesses (already struggling to find staff) or necessitate distanced new employees travelling into the site, thereby increasing car journeys further. (There is no provision for staff accommodation on site). These low-skilled employment opportunities are also contrary to Cherwell's strategic aim of prioritising knowledge-based investment as a priority

This resort will not be open to the public. The possibility of being offered expensive day passes will be solely dependent upon poor hotel occupancy, which is obviously not in the developers' plans! As the majority of guests are encouraged to stay and spend their money on site, there will be negligible economic benefit to the local hospitality industry.

Objection to Great Wolf Hotel and Water Park proposal in Chesterton, Bicester

I hereby strongly object to the proposal to build a Hotel and Water Park on the edge of our village in Chesterton. The proposal is not in accordance with the local development plan and there are no material considerations that would warrant planning permission to be granted.

Our 300 year old Thatched Cottage is located on the A4095. I am extremely concerned about the severe increase in traffic directly outside our house and throughout the country lanes to and from the village. During busiest times, I would envisage traffic queuing outside our house with car engines running continuously. As we live in a Thatched Cottage, we have no front garden and our period windows are single glazed. The additional traffic would increase noise pollution and reduce air quality.

The A4095 is already an extremely busy 'rat-run'. I can always tell if there are traffic problems on the M40 or A34 because it becomes difficult to pull out of our driveway as cars use the A4095 as an escape route. I cross the road at least four times per day, walking my children to and from Chesterton school, and it already remains difficult and dangerous to cross due to the high volume of cars.

The existing road infrastructure, and that of neighbouring villages, can't cope with the extra 1000+ daily increase in traffic volume. Roads in Chesterton are narrow and dangerous to walkers, joggers, cyclists and dog walkers already. Increased traffic would increase these dangers.

I remain concerned about the significant disruption and pollution from a 2 year build programme. The village has already undergone the building of two new housing estates with heavy construction vehicles and the road being dug up several times, needing temporary traffic lights to manage the traffic. This village has had enough disruption and building already.

This proposal is unsustainable due to its inappropriate location on the edge of our village. The Great Wolf development includes 900 car parking spaces with a significant reliance on car travel which goes against the Cherwell Strategy of reducing car usage. The scheme

comprises a total floor area of 500,000 sq.ft on this greenfield site which will have a damaging and irreversible impact on the landscape and views of the site. It has a negative ecological impact with loss of green field habitat for an abundance of wildlife.

With potentially over 2,000 visitors each day, acceptance of this proposal will have a disastrous impact on the area and therefore Great Wolf should have worked with Cherwell District Council to agree a site through the correct local planning process. This is a speculative planning application, in the wrong location and should be refused on this basis

Great Wolf will need to find 400+ employees. Businesses in Bicester already struggle to find the required workforce to meet their needs. I don't feel there is a need for more job availability in the locality, in fact, Great Wolf will either take away employees from local businesses or they will bring in employment from other areas, therefore increasing traffic volume. I refute Great Wolf's claims of benefitting the local economy. The proposal will not benefit the local economy in Chesterton – for example the Red Cow Pub and The Chesterton Hotel, as there will be accommodation and on-site / fast food available within the Great Wolf complex.

I urge Great Wolf to consider finding a new location for this proposal. In accordance with Government policies, such developments should be directed towards brownfield sites.

I strongly oppose this development and will be active in the campaign to stop this going ahead. Please reconsider.

I am writing to register a number of objections to the above planning application.

The application is not in accordance with the local development plan and there are no material considerations which would warrant planning permission being granted.

Traffic impact

This is probably the most damaging impact of the proposed development. It is also entirely at odds with Cherwell's own strategy of trying to reduce car usage in the area since it will have the opposite effect.

The development includes 900 parking spaces. Adding this number of car parking spaces will lead to a very significant increase in the traffic volume passing through Chesterton. The increase has been estimated at more than 1,000 car journeys per day, which is very significant for a small village like Chesterton with only minor roads to service it.

Chesterton already suffers from serious traffic congestion when there are traffic problems on the M40 or A34, which happens frequently. Its roads will not be able to cope with an increase in the traffic volume of this order.

I understand that Great Wolf Resorts are proposing to route visitor traffic via the surrounding villages of Middleton Stoney, Weston on the Green and Wendlebury. The experience of Soho Farmhouse and Sandford St Martin shows that this strategy will not succeed. Many visitors to Soho Farmhouse continue to rely on their cars' satnav systems, which take them through the village of Sandford St Martin, despite the signs placed on the B4030 which direct visitors to Soho Farmhouse to use the B4022. Chesterton will suffer the same fate as Sandford St Martin if the development is approved. Many visitors will continue to go through the village regardless of any road signs placed at exits 9 and 10 of the M40 because that is how their car satnavs will direct them.

The roads passing through Middleton Stoney, Weston on the Green and Wendlebury are already under significant strain due to existing traffic volumes. They would not be able to cope with the additional traffic volumes contemplated by the proposed development. In addition, this routing strategy would direct additional traffic onto the A34, a road which already suffers from very heavy traffic congestion.

Scale

The scale of the proposed development is totally out of keeping with a small Oxfordshire village like Chesterton. Great Wolf proposes to construct 500,000 sq. ft. of buildings. A development of this scale is massive in the context of what is a small village. The buildings will be totally out of proportion to anything else in the village.

Design

The applicant's plans show a development containing two or three very large blocks of low-rise buildings. Development on this scale will be totally out of keeping with the current buildings in the village, which are small detached houses. The low-rise design also means that the buildings would spread across much of the site, giving a much more urban feel to what is currently a rural area.

The development would not therefore enhance the character of the local area.

Ecological impact

The plans involve building on a golf course. This is effectively a greenfield site. By building on much of this site, the development will inevitably result in a loss of habitat for wildlife.

Lack of economic benefits for the local area

Most of the jobs created by the development will be low paid jobs in the leisure and retail industries. These are not the sort of jobs which this area needs. The area needs 'high tech' jobs in the knowledge-based economy of the future. These are the sorts of industries which the council should be concentrating on trying to encourage to the area.

Another relevant factor is that local businesses are unlikely to benefit from the Great Wolf development. The developer's intention is to keep its guests on site so that they stay in its hotel, using its restaurants, shops and leisure facilities. As a result, local shops and restaurants will not benefit from any additional customers.

The proposed development fails against many of the criteria against which Cherwell judges such applications. It brings few, if any, benefits to the area and will bring significant disadvantages, particularly in relation to traffic congestion. As a result, I would urge you to reject the application.



I am writing to you to object to the planning application detailed above. In my view the proposal is not in accordance with the local development plan and I do not think that there are any material considerations at all that would warrant planning permission being granted.

I am not a local resident. However I regularly visit relatives and friends in both Chesterton and Little Chesterton, both of which are right next to the proposed development. I also play golf at Bicester Golf and Spa – a site that will be completely ruined by the proposed development. The proposed site (which is right next to two very small and rural villages) is far too large. It totals a massive 500,000 sq. ft of built form on what is currently an ecological green field site. Ecological habitats that we all value will be completely ruined and will vanish, never to return. The proposal will also lead to significant and irreversible impact on the landscape and views of the site. In short, this will cause irreversible damage to the ecosystem.

The impact on local traffic will be a catastrophe. Whenever I drive there it is obvious that the existing road infrastructure, and that of surrounding villages, is already totally overcrowded and not fit for purpose. It will comprise 500,000 square feet of building on a greenfield site, irreversibly removing important green space and disrupting ecological habitats for an abundance of wildlife.

The existing road infrastructure cannot cope with the projected extra 1000+ daily car movements. Objection to Planning Application Ref: 19/02550/F - Proposed Water Park by Great Wolf

I wish to object to the above-mentioned planning application. The proposal in not in accordance with the development plan and the negligible benefits of the scheme are not sufficient to outweigh the significant and demonstrable impacts the scheme will have on the local area. The applicant is clearly seeking to deliver what is an urban style development in a rural location outside of the settlement boundary of Chesterton village. The objection is on the following grounds:-

1. Unsustainable form of development

This is a significant development that will attract high levels of visitors every day and Cherwell District Council's (CDC) Policy SLE3 states that such developments should be located in highly sustainable locations adjacent to a multitude of transport modes to reduce the reliance on car usage. Policy ESD1 also seeks to distribute new developments to sustainable locations to tackle Cherwell's commitment to climate change. The site is on the edge of Chesterton village in an inherently unsustainable location will low accessibility to public transport and the scheme provides for 900 car parking spaces (therefore promoting car usage) and is therefore contrary to Policy SLE3 and ESD1.

The site is currently greenfield, open space and policy BSC10 seeks to ensure there is sufficient quantity and quality of open space, sport and recreation provision by protecting and enhancing existing provision. The planning system should be supporting the redevelopment of previously developed, brownfield sites, or allocated sites in sustainable locations adjacent to public transport modes, not on a greenfield site that will irreversibly remove valuable open space. This is totally the wrong location for such a proposal and whatever gestures or promises the applicant provides for in terms of improved access, bus services or cycle routes, the site is in an inherently unsustainable location and not appropriate for such a development.

2. Landscape Impact and Design

The proposed scheme is not in-keeping with the local area which is characterised by 2/3 storey buildings which are detached and in clusters. The Countryside Design Summary (2008) published by CDC provides guidance for developments in locations such as this and supports developments of small scale, low height and detached. Also saved Policy T5 of the Cherwell Local Plan 1996 states that new hotels in rural locations will only be approved where they would largely be accommodated in existing buildings of totally replace an existing commercial operation.

Policy ESD13 states that successful design should contribute to an area's character representing the traditional form, scale and massing of buildings. Paragraph 170 of the NPPF states that planning decisions should recognise the intrinsic character and beauty of the countryside.

The development consists of a large bulk of 500,000 sq.ft of built form and mass and at a significantly greater height than any of the other buildings in the vicinity of the site and this is all to be delivered on what is currently greenfield site with no buildings on it. The proposal is therefore contrary to the Countryside Design Summary, saved Policy T5, ESD13 and paragraph 170 of the NPPF.

3. Traffic

Policy ESD1 supports new developments that reduce the need to travel by car and Policy SLE4 states that new developments should facilitate the use of sustainable modes of transport. CDC's 1996 saved Policy TR7 states that developments that will attract a large number of vehicles onto minor roads will not normally be permitted.

The existing road infrastructure cannot cope with the projected extra 1000 - 1,500 daily car movements. Chesterton is already a 'rat-run' and experiences major congestion as an escape route during the many traffic issues on the M40 and A34. The applicant is seeking to re-route traffic down the A34 particularly and doesn't appear to appreciate the issues that we already encounter on the A34. The slip road at Weston on the Green is notorious for accidents due to the short length of the slip road. Great Wolf is directing traffic to use this slip road so will exacerbate the already significant issues. There is no reference or consideration for this aspect in the Applicant's Transport Assessment.

The proposal is therefore contrary to Policies SLE4 and saved policy TR7.

4. Loss of Golf Club

Cherwell is already losing a well-used golf club at North Oxford for housing and this proposal will result in the loss of another 18 hole course. We need these types of facilities in Cherwell and Bicester to support the new housing growth. If we lose this course, there will yet again be a reliance on car travel out of Bicester or Cherwell to find alternative courses further creating unnecessary and additional car travel. In addition, this positively contributes to the open space around Bicester and will be lost forever.

The Bicester Golf Club is well used and having reviewed Bicester Hotel and Spa's company accounts, that are publically available at Companies House, there are no signs of viability issues with the current 18 holes operation. In the published 2019 accounts it states:-

REVIEW OF BUSINESS

The company saw a slight reduction in turnover over the previous year yet increased profitability through greater efficiency. The local rooms market had levelled out during the year following the introduction of additional rooms to the area in the previous period and that allowed the company to re-establish itself as a leader in the local market. Occupancy levels have recovered, and with a growth too in average rate, RevPar has increased. Golf subscriptions have followed national trends, with a continued decrease in membership numbers, however additional income from other golf segments have partially compensated for this and the contribution from golf operations has increased tremendously. The Health Club performance was comparable with last year with both sales and contribution seeing little change. However there are significant development plans for the coming year in this area which will see the offering greatly improved with some very unique facilities.

An increase in the National Living Wage was absorbed within an overall reduced payroll spend, compared to the previous year. This saving, along with other operational cost reduction initiatives, resulted in a net profit for the year of £264,860, a significant increase over the year ended October 2017 despite the reduced turnover.

So in summary the Bicester Hotel and golf resort has publically stated that:-

'The company saw a slight reduction in tumover over the previous year yet increase profitability through greater efficiency' and 'Golf subscriptions have followed the national trends, with continued decrease in membership levels, however additional income from other golf segments has partially compensated for this and the contribution from golf operations has increased tremendously.'

The above suggests the current business is performing well and there are no viability issues to warrant the removal of 9 or the 18 holes and no justification has been provided for by the applicant to demonstrate viability issues.

5. Conclusion

The proposal is not in accordance with the development plan and represents an unsustainable form of development delivering 500,000 sq,ft of built form on a greenfield site whilst also putting significant pressure on the existing road network. It is totally the wrong location for such a significant development and as such this planning application should be refused.

Planning Application Ref: 19/02550/F - Objection to Proposed Water Park by Great Wolf

I wish to object to the planning application as shown above as the proposal is not in accordance with the development plan and the small number of benefits of the scheme are not sufficient to outweigh the significant impacts the scheme will have on the local area.

As a resident of Chesterton living on the A4095, should the scheme go ahead I will be extremely concerned by the traffic passing by my family's house, particularly with two small children.

At present there is no crossing into the village from this side of the road or a footpath running into Bicester or in other locations such as along The Hale. The volume of traffic is continually increasing with the number of new houses being built on the Kingsmere and Elmsbrook estates, therefore further traffic created from the proposed hotel/waterpark is going to make this road very dangerous.

I also wish to object on the following planning grounds:-

1. Unsustinable Development

This is a significant development that will attract high levels of visitors every day and Cherwell District Council's (CDC) Policy SLE3 states that such developments should be located highly sustainable locations adjacent a multitude of transport modes to reduce the reliance on car usage. Policy ESD1 also seeks to distribute new developments to sustainable locations to tackle Cherwell's commitment to climate change. The site is on the edge of Chesterton village in an inherently unsustainable location will low accessibility to public transport and the scheme provides for 900 car parking spaces (therefore promoting car usage) and is therefore contrary to Policy SLE3 and ESD1.

The site is currently greenfield, open space and policy BSC10 seeks to ensure there is sufficient quantity and quality of open space, sport and recreation provision by protecting and enhancing existing provision. The planning system should be supporting the redevelopment of previously developed, brownfield sites, or allocated sites in sustainable locations adjacent to public transport modes, not on a greenfield site that will irreversibly remove open space. This is totally the wrong location for such a proposal and whatever gestures or promises the applicant provides in terms of improved access, bus services of cycle routes, the site is inherently unsustainable and not appropriate for such a development.

2. Landscape Impact and Design

The proposed scheme is not in-keeping with the local area which is characterised by 2/3 storey buildings which are detached and clustered. The Countryside Design Summary (2008) published by CDC provides guidance for developments in locations such as this and supports development of small scale, low height and detached. Also saved policy T5 of the Cherwell Local Plan 1996 states that new hotels in rural locations will only be approved where they would largely be accommodated in existing buildings of totally replace an existing commercial operation.

Policy ESD13 states that successful design should contribute to an area's character representing the traditional form, scale and massing of buildings. Paragraph 170 of the NPPF states that planning decision should recognise the intrinsic character and beauty of the countryside.

The development consists of a large bulk of 500,000 sq.ft of built form and mass on a site of greater height than any other buildings in the vicinity of the site and this is all delivered on what is currently greenfield site. The proposal is therefore contrary to the Countryside Design Summary, saved Policy T5, ESD13 and paragraph 170 of the NPPF.

3. Traffic

Policy ESD1 supports new developments that reduce the need to travel by car and Policy SLE4 states that new developments should facilitate the use of sustainable modes of transport. Saved policy TR7 states that developments that will attract a large number of vehicles onto minor roads will not normally be permitted.

The existing road infrastructure cannot cope with the projected extra 1000 – 1,500 daily car movements. Chesterton is already a 'rat-run' and experiences major congestion as an escape route during the many traffic issues on the M40 and A34. The Applicant is seeking to re-route traffic down the A34 particularly and doesn't appear to understand the issues that we already encounter on the A34. The slip road at Weston on the Green is notorious for accidents due to the short length of the slip road. Great Wolf is directing traffic to use this slip road so will exacerbate the issues. There is no reference or consideration for this aspect in the Applicant's Transport Assessment.

The proposal is therefore contrary to Policies SLE4 and saved policy TR7.

In conclusion to the above comments, I strongly oppose the above scheme. The location is completely wrong and would have a very damaging effect on the village and nearly places.

To whom it may concern,

I whole-heartedly object to this application for a large-scale water theme park in the small village of Chesterton, numbering 750 residents. I have severe concerns about the large-scale construction of this development which I believe will irreversibly change our landscape forever and damage our environment.

This is currently a stunning greenfield site providing a healthy sporting facility, which will be lost to a vast and inappropriately sized concreted area with large uncharacteristic buildings for a small village. The 900-space car park indicates the anticipated huge volume of extra traffic that will be travelling to and from the site, bringing with it a substantial increase in noise pollution, not to mention a decrease in air quality and potentially adding to the associated health issues currently being identified nationally.

This will be a private resort attracting a proposed 500,00 visitors, and their vehicles, annually into an area already suffering from severe traffic congestion issues on the M40, A34, A41, A4095 and B430. The infrastructure of the area will simply not be able to sustain this proposed development, to the detriment of thousands of residents and businesses. The conference facilities will also attract an unknown but substantial extra number of car movements and resulting congestion.

Economically, the development will provide very little benefit to the local area, which already has very low unemployment. It's requirement to employ 600 lower skilled staff will either attract employees away from existing local businesses (already struggling to find staff) or necessitate distanced new employees travelling into the site, thereby increasing car journeys further. (There is no provision for staff accommodation on site). These low-skilled employment opportunities are also contrary to Cherwell's strategic aim of prioritising knowledge-based investment as a priority

I also don't believe that this meets Cherwell Councils vision for a clean and green Oxfordshire having recently declared a climate emergency. Achieving a reduction of greenhouse gas emissions to net zero by 2050 will be impossible with the proposed infrastructure construction and increased vehicle traffic. Also taking away the green space to be concreted over cannot achieve the aim of increasing biodiversity.

Once again, I strongly object to this unwanted and unneeded proposal, completely out of keeping with its rural location, and ask that it be refused.

I wish to strongly object to the above-mentioned application on the grounds that this proposal is not in accordance with the local development plan. There are no material considerations that would warrant planning permission being granted.

It is unsustainable, in an inappropriate location on the edge of a small historic village. The development includes a 900-space car park, indicating a significant reliance on car travel which goes against the Cherwell Strategy of reducing car usage. It will comprise 500,000 square feet of building on a greenfield site, irreversibly removing important green space and disrupting ecological habitats for an abundance of wildlife.

The existing road infrastructure cannot cope with the projected extra 1000+ daily car movements. Chesterton is already a 'rat-run' and experiences major congestion as an escape route during the many traffic issues on the M40 and A34. In addition to several other significant proposals approved in Bicester, its unacceptable routing plans via Middleton Stoney, Weston on the Green and Wendlebury, will seriously affect the already stressed A34, A41, A4095 and B430. This will also result in a significant deterioration in air quality and a substantial increase in noise pollution for local residents.

The design of the buildings is neither small scale nor detached and therefore not in keeping with the character of the local area.

Local businesses are already finding it difficult to recruit the employees Great Wolf will be targeting. As such, they will either take employees away from local businesses - a negative economic impact, or they will bring in employment from other areas, thereby increasing traffic movements. With the vast majority of visitors remaining on site, there will be very little (if any) economic benefit to local businesses.

With the loss of 9 holes of a beautifully landscaped golf course, how will they safeguard the remaining 9 holes? Open space provision appears to be rapidly disappearing in Cherwell, which is totally unacceptable when it serves such an important purpose in communities and for well-being. Once again, existing golf users will have to drive further afield to access alternative 18-hole courses, thereby increasing car usage.

For the above reasons, I strongly request that planning permission NOT be granted for this application.

I object strongly to the proposed Great Wolf Resort for the Village of Chesterton currently a beautiful rural village near to where I live with my family in Weston on the Green.

The proposed development is in Chesterton, not near Chesterton!

500,000 visitors per year from all over the UK + 400 employees will significantly increase in traffic generated and would have a major negative impact on already very busy roads in poor state of repair, affecting Chesterton, Little Chesterton, Middleton Stoney, Weston on the Green, Bucknell, Ardley with Fewcott, Bletchingdon and Kirtlington.

Bicester town would experience even more traffic on already congested road system, particularly the A41 and A4095. Potential increase in accidents and traffic jams.

A4095 through Chesterton already very busy as through road to Witney and used as a rat run when regular problems hit the A34 and M40 junction 9.

Chicane on A4095 by Chesterton Hotel, would severely damage and be dangerous.

Roads in Chesterton are narrow and dangerous to walkers/joggers/cyclists/dog walkers already. Increased traffic would increase these dangers.

Satnavs will take people the quickest route, ie. through Little Chesterton which is an extremely narrow single- track lane with 90-degree corners and limited passing places, very dangerous road.

With additional housing on Kingsmere, traffic entering/leaving/using Vendee Drive will be hugely increased, prior to giving consideration to the extra traffic for the waterpark and greatly increased BSA facility.

In accordance with government policies such developments should be directed to brownfield sites.

Design of the development is not in keeping with the Oxfordshire landscape

We feel an 80ft high indoor water park is definitely not inkeeping!

A 4 storey hotel twice the height of the existing Bicester Golf Hotel with potentially

500 rooms x 4.5 people with an average occupation 2-3 nights = 1000+ car movements per week.

Plus Food delivery vehicles, laundry services, Plus the amount of water being used constantly will surely have an effect on water pressure in surrounding villages?

There will be a significant disruption and pollution from the 2-year build programme Noise pollution – cars, people, night entertainment

Light pollution during evening/nightime (Carpark for 900+ cars), plus the large increase in evening light resulting from the BSA application pitch lighting

Air pollution from extra vehicles of all sizes (cars, deliveries/construction).

This will not benefit the local economy in Chesterton (Red Cow and Chesterton Hotel will not benefit due to on-site/fast food service (outweighing any positives).

Benefits to Chesterton village community?? Purely profit-making venture for GWR?

Bicester Village causes traffic gridlock, plus two more hotels are already under construction and a retail park. We cannot have any more, the infrastructure around will not cope and rural communities will be further destroyed.

Constant work on Kingsmere, Vendee Drive, Middleton Stoney road from Bicester, Howes Lane, the new warehousing and the expansion of the Bicester Sports Association site all impact on Chesterton hugely.

Expansion of Bicester Health Club and hotel already underway will result in major increase of traffic through village.

Substantial expansion of village school to almost double its current size will result in major increase in traffic/footfall through village

A34 is already unsuitable for the amount of traffic using it.

Plans for warehousing along the A41 will result in a vast increase in heavy traffic.

Protection of wildlife (e.g. Great Crested Newts) and green spaces between A34, M40 and proposed expressway needs preservation— not reducing. So much green space/trees etc lost due to Kingsmere and other developments around Bicester.

As a resident of Chesterton, I am writing to you to express my deep concerns about the proposal to develop a resort and theme park in my village. The proposal is not in accordance with the local development plan and there are no material considerations that would warrant planning permission being granted. Further objections focus predominantly around the subject of its sustainability and suitability in a small Oxfordshire village.

A development of this scale, with the sole aim of attracting large numbers of people, poses an overbearing presence in terms of the resort's 500,000 sq. ft. of buildings. The vast 900 space car park and 500 hotel rooms planned would mean that, at capacity, the number of hotel guests and staff would equal the whole village population, with the potential to inflict more than double the traffic movements on small local lanes.

The proposed site is beside the M40, one of busiest motorways in the UK which already deposits an unsustainable amount of traffic onto the A34, the A41, Bicester town and its surrounding villages. Any amendments to the local road infrastructure to cater for traffic bound for the resort would only add to local air, noise and light pollution and cause further damage to the environment through loss of greenbelt land, the tarmac over swathes of countryside and loss of valuable hedgerows. In turn this would lead to a higher water table and risk of local flooding, not to mention the constant threat to our precious but dwindling local wildlife.

Sadly, in Chesterton we already hear the constant noise from the M40 and A41. As a result of the Kingsmere development and Vendee Drive, the village now sits like an island, surrounded by noise from these busy roads. The resort would generate a substantial increase in vehicle movements through Chesterton, especially by those travelling to and from the M40 and Bicester Village, adding to the noise, disruption and driving hazards on our country lanes. There are other significant proposals that are either awaiting decision (expansion of Bicester Sports Association site in Chesterton) or have been approved (Kingsmere housing and retail park, Bicester Gateway and Bicester Heritage) and the Great Wolf proposal would simply swamp an area already struggling to cope with current accelerated development.

Approached by B-roads and pretty green lanes, Chesterton is a typical English village situated on a Roman road, with its own conservation area, two greens, ancient lanes and pathways, numerous historical and/or listed buildings of note and a 12th century parish church. Although subject in recent years to two new modern developments, there remains a feeling of neighbourly cohesion among its residents, who have chosen to live in a rural area rather than a town in order to enjoy the quiet and privacy this offers. We accept the trade-off of not having a bus service or local shop in return for a slower, more peaceful way of life. A large influx of holiday-makers, thrill-seekers or tourists in the area would completely destroy the very nature of the quiet lifestyle we seek. Furthermore, a four-

storey, 500 room hotel, in whatever style it is built, its accompanying 84 foot high waterpark hangar and huge carpark are all completely at odds with the local architectural style. Great Wolf Lodges all appear to be built in a very specific all-American style of architecture which would neither integrate nor blend in remotely with the existing Bicester Hotel & Spa and most importantly, Chesterton, other surrounding villages and the English countryside.

My overriding concerns about these proposals are the lack of sustainability and considerable ecological impact. The plans encompass a vast area which is currently green space and golf fairways within an area of green belt land. The combination of the car park, the hotel and the waterpark hangar together demands an enormous footprint, all of which would be under concrete. The design makes no attempt at eco-efficiency and construction alone would demand colossal resources in terms of unsustainable raw materials, water, energy, etc. The damage to green space, flora and fauna would be irreversible with these vital elements of the rural landscape disappearing forever. This is tragic, especially in this day and age when we are striving to reverse these threats to the natural world.

Aside from ecologically unsustainability, the resort would be unsustainable in its supply chain and staffing. Most of the 600 jobs on offer would be low-paid and unskilled bar and domestic shift work, which would not support local people with a wage that meets the high cost of living in this area. Local businesses already struggle to get the staff they require, with local unemployment being at record lows. There are already two large hotels planned for Bicester – Holiday Inn Express (149 rooms) and Bicester Heritage Hotel (344 rooms). Add these to the 500 rooms planned by Great Wolf and it begs the question of who is going to staff these establishments. It is highly unlikely that all the staff requirements would be met locally meaning even more 24-hour, 7-day-a-week vehicle movements by commuters and potential overcrowding on public transport. The claim that the resort would be good for employment is an empty promise, as we don't need additional employment in the area, especially if it is low paid work. Furthermore, the proposal is contrary to CDC's strategic aim of prioritising Knowledge Based business investment, thereby offering employment that supports the 'Knowledge Economy'.

A claim was made that the resort would source all its food from local farms however I am very sceptical about this and regard it as merely a sweetener to pacify the local people during the proposal stages. Considering the likely ingredients required for menus at an American-owned, family-oriented visitor attraction (pizzas, hot dogs, burgers, etc.) it would not make commercial sense for Great Wolf to purchase supplies from local farmers as their produce and raw ingredients clearly would not meet these needs; it's much more likely that frozen and chilled food would be bought in bulk from contract food processors, manufacturers and catering suppliers to the hotel trade. Therefore, the demands of Great Wolf's supply chain, for its food at least, would do nothing whatsoever to enhance the local economy or help our farming community.

Although the development may garner some support from Bicester town's residents who have been tempted with the questionable idea of day passes, they do not live in Chesterton. I urge you to take *my* objections and those of my fellow villagers very seriously. Our objections are not simply a case of "Not in my back yard" but "Not in *anyone*'s back yard' because the proposals for this resort are totally out of scale, completely unsuitable for a rural location and would have a hugely negative impact on the people who live here.

I wish to strongly object to the above-mentioned application on the grounds that this proposal is not in accordance with the local development plan.

It is unsustainable, in an inappropriate location on the edge of a small historic village. The development includes a 900-space car park, indicating a significant reliance on car travel which goes against the Cherwell Strategy of reducing car usage. It will comprise 500,000 square feet of building on a greenfield site, irreversibly removing important green space and disrupting ecological habitats for an abundance of wildlife. The design of the buildings is neither small scale nor detached and therefore not in keeping with the character of the local area.

The existing road infrastructure cannot cope with the projected extra 1000+ daily car movements. Chesterton is already a 'rat-run' and experiences major congestion as an escape route during the many traffic issues on the M40 and A34. In addition to several other significant proposals approved in Bicester, its unacceptable routing plans via Middleton Stoney, Weston on the Green and Wendlebury, will seriously affect the already stressed A34, A41, A4095 and B430. This will also result in a significant deterioration in air quality and a substantial increase in noise pollution for local residents.

Local businesses are already finding it difficult to recruit the employees Great Wolf will be targeting. As such, they will either take employees away from local businesses - a negative economic impact, or they will bring in employment from other areas, thereby increasing traffic movements. With the vast majority of visitors remaining on site, there will be very little (if any) economic benefit to local businesses.

With the loss of 9 holes of a beautifully landscaped golf course, how will they safeguard the remaining 9 holes? Open space provision appears to be rapidly disappearing in Cherwell, which is totally unacceptable when it serves such an important purpose in communities and for well-being. Once again, existing golf users will have to drive further afield to access alternative 18-hole courses, thereby increasing car usage.

For the above reasons, I strongly request that planning permission NOT be granted for this application.

I am writing to you in order to express my objection to the proposed planning application by Great Lakes UK in Chesterton, Oxfordshire, as referenced above.

The reasons for my objection are as follows:

A large proportion of Chesterton is located in a conservation area, surrounded by greenbelt, where there is protection of open spaces and views, a requirement for developments to preserve or enhance the area and restrictions that require many residents to request approval from Cherwell District Council to make minor changes to their homes such as replacement windows or erection of satellite dishes. With this in mind, I believe that the excessive size, scale and design of the proposed hotel and waterpark is completely inappropriate, it will have a significant and irreversible impact on a green field site and fail to meet requirements of the Cherwell District Council Countryside Design Scheme 2008 to enhance the character of the local area.

This proposed development would bring no economic benefit for the local area for the following reasons:

- Bicester has an impressively low level of unemployment (circa 80 people), it is my understanding that this development will require approx. 600 members of staff. Therefore it is likely to remove employees from existing local businesses many of whom are SMEs which contribute to the local economy, in comparison to Great Lakes UK which has been established by a large foreign corporation.
- The resort appears to be completely insular, all food and entertainment is provided on site, giving guests no reason at all to visit the local area. This will prevent opportunities for local businesses to benefit from the increase in tourism.
- The hotel is for waterpark guests only therefore it will not assist with providing additional accommodation for employees/guests of local businesses.

 The type of business development is not in keeping with Cherwell District Council's strategic aim of supporting the 'Knowledge Economy'.

The increased traffic associated with this development renders the application inappropriate for the following reasons:

- Chesterton is an escape route for many traffic issues that occur on the A34 and M40. During these times the village becomes completely paralysed and certainly could not cope with an additional 1,000 vehicles.
- The proposed routing plans utilise an already stressed road network, Chesterton, Middleton Stoney, Weston on the Green, the A34 and M40 all suffer severe traffic disruptions on a very regular basis. As improvements to the M40 and A34 have so far been unable to resolve the current traffic problems, an additional 1,000 vehicles per day would only compound the issue.
- As mentioned above, there are insufficient levels of unemployment in Bicester to provide the level of staff required for the resort. It is therefore highly probable that a large proportion of the employees will commute from all over the county adding even more vehicles to the over stressed road system.
- Current developments in the local area such as Bicester Gateway, Bicester Heritage, Kingsmere etc have already increased traffic both permanent and construction, the road networks have not been updated to cope with this let alone the huge number of construction, employee, visitor and delivery vehicles that the Great Lakes UK resort will attract.

As a resident of Chesterton I have serious concerns over the sustainability of the proposed development for the following reasons:

- The M40 already creates a high level of noise pollution, as do vehicles travelling on the A4095. The huge number of vehicles that would be visiting the proposed development everyday would be an unwelcome addition to this noise, severely impacting on the quality of life for residents.
- In addition to the noise pollution caused by the increased traffic, there would be an increase in air pollution. A study in 2019, widely documented by the press, found that air pollution in Europe causes more extra deaths per year than smoking. With this in mind we should be rejecting any developments that would cause such a significant increase in road use.
- The development makes no significant, groundbreaking or even ambitious proposals to be sustainable.
- There will be a loss of green field habitat for an abundance of wildlife, in a time when we are realizing the importance of a wide and diverse eco system that encourages biodiversity, we should reject any development proposals that will negatively impact on our countryside.
- Due to the sprawling design of the resort and the excessively large footprint
 of its buildings, a large amount of rainwater will be diverted from its natural
 course. Whilst some of this can be diverted via sustainable drainage
 strategies, a large proportion will be directed to the local drainage system

which is already over capacity and often requires remediation by Thames Water.

I do not understand why there has been a lack of consultation, Great Lakes UK should have worked with Cherwell District Council to find an appropriately allocated site through the local plan process. This is a speculative planning application in the wrong location and should be refused on that basis.

In light of the above, it is clear that the proposed development does not meet the requirements of the local development plan, there are no material considerations that would warrant planning permission to be granted and the resort would have an adverse effect on the local population.

Please take this letter as a very strong objection to the proposed planning application and I urge you to recommend to the council members to vote against this application.

Chesterton, is an unsustainable location with no public transport, footpath or cycle path and access for guests to this resort can only be by car, coach or taxi. In July 2019 Cherwell District Councillors unanimously declared a climate emergency. With a planned zero carbon emissions by 2030 how can they support this development which is solely dependent on car travel to and from the site?

The existing road infrastructure is struggling to cope with the increase of traffic due to the high development of the area. Junction 10 of the M40 is at capacity and Junction 9 of the M40 has been confirmed by the Highways Agency as worse since the last upgrade. The A4095 is the escape route for traffic incidents on A34, M40 and A41, this has not been included within the calculations of the traffic management for this application. The warehousing developments around the perimeter of Bicester are increasing the volume of traffic along the A4059, this has also not been taken into consideration in this application.

The proposed "Nature Trail" is misleading as it is actually the rerouting of an existing public footpath. There is also the presumption that this Public Footpath will be given permission to be moved.

Financial benefits to the area are questionable, unemployment in Cherwell is very low, how will staff travel to and from the site? With possibly 200 staff per shift that is a lot of mini busses if there is not staff parking provided, the logistics of this are questionable.

There is no real provision for surface water runoff, the buildings and carpark will create vast quantities of water where will this go without adding to the already flooding water courses?

The whole area is short of water, the swimming pools might recycle their water but 498 family bedrooms and public toilets and changing/washing facilities will all be requiring fresh water. These same facilities will create foul water and sewage, where in the local system is this to go? The foul drainage structure is at capacity with incidents of sewage from the Bicester Hotel pipework bursting and discharging into a village ditch in December 2019.

The building design is appalling, urbanising a vast area of what was 9 holes of a gold course.

Cherwell Local Plan Executive Summary, page 10 states;

"Limiting growth in our rural areas and directing it towards larger and more sustainable villages. Aiming to strictly control development in open countryside"

This application goes against the Cherwell Structure plan and the National Planning Framework, I would suggest this makes it a speculative plan with no chance of being passed?

Chesterton does not need this development and considering the points raised above planning permission should not be granted.

I am writing to strongly object to this application for a large-scale water theme park in the small village of Chesterton. It is totally out of keeping with the predominantly rural nature of this part of the District, would lead to significant transport issues in Chesterton and neighbouring villages, which are already past breaking point with excessive traffic and HGVs, and provide no benefit for the local communities. It is also not in keeping with the local development plan.

The site is currently a greenfield site and construction of this significant building would irreversibly remove important green space and disrupt ecological habitats for an abundance of wildlife. The proposed water tower would be the tallest building in Cherwell causing significant visual impairment while the proposed car park would rival the size of Bicester Village. The whole structure and design is totally out of keeping with the rural character of the local area, and with the Council's stated desire to tackle climate change.

As far as transport is concerned the existing road infrastructure cannot cope with the developments the Council has already approved (eg in Upper Heyford and on the outskirts of Bicester) with the result that traffic in Middleton Stoney is already gridlocked at certain times of the day and adding 1000+ daily car movements would just increase the air pollution and misery for local residents. I have spoken to the developers of the scheme and it is clear to me that they have no real knowledge of local conditions nor any serious plans to deal with construction traffic (both vans and HGVS). I think it inconceivable any Council concerned with climate change could approve such a scheme .

Economically the development will provide very little, if any, added benefit to local residents since the resort will not in any meaningful sense be open to the public, there will be little to no interaction with local businesses and the 600 lower skilled jobs it claims to provide are either likely to disrupt existing businesses or add significantly to traffic movements as new employees travel some distance.

In summary this is an unwanted proposal which is not in line with the local development plan, would cause detriment to the environment, aggravate considerably the transport problems already faced in all our villages, bring no benefits to local communities and be an eyesore for miles around. I ask that the Planning Committee refuse the application in its entirety.

I would like to register my objection to the following: Great Lakes UK Ltd. Planning Application No. 19/02550/F Please see below for my objections.

I would like to object to the proposed development for a water park resort at Chesterton. Myself and my young family moved into this area 5 years ago. Since we moved into our house on the b430 at Weston on the green traffic on this road has risen by 40%, according to parish council surveys of traffic on his road, This level of increase has created a huge pressure in local infrastructure, and have adversely impacted our quality of life and our ability to enjoy the light and views from our windows without being blighted by high speed HGVs and speeding commuters hurtling through the village to escape traffic building up at Junction 9 of the M40. In my view it is vital therefore that any future planning developments proposed in this area are sited in sustainable locations otherwise this pressure will increase without end.

The proposed development by Great Lakes is sited in an inappropriate location on the edge of a small village which has limited access via public transport or indeed any routes other than the b430. Approval to this development will result in huge increases in traffic for local residents, the developer had modelled the impact of some of their visitor arriving by car, but this is far from the full picture. Staff, deliveries, construction and visitor traffic will create a huge burden on already busy local roads. The developer's estimate of 1000 car journeys accessing the site is far from complete.

The development includes 900 car parking spaces. We all know that families struggle to travel light so visitors to the site will rely on car travel. Families will not use the train line into Bicester village (or Bicester North, or indeed Oxford Parkway), with already over packed commuter trains with no luggage compartments it just isn't practical for a family to travel via this route. Even if they do, they will then need to complete their journey by taxi. All of this will just result in more car users, this goes against the Cherwell Strategy of reducing car usage in the district. and points to an unsustainable location fit a family oriented resort.

The planning of other local developments at Kingsmere, Bicester heritage and Bicester gateway will all increase traffic in the area, all using the a34/a41 access roads that are already struggling at peak times. To load these roads yet further will create chaos in rush hour.

We moved to the area to be in the countryside, this development proposes 500,000 sq. ft of built form on what is currently a greenfield site irreversibly removing important green infrastructure and disrupting ecological habitats. This isn't what rural communities want to see done to their local environment. They want green fields, agricultural management and the fresh air that comes with open spaces on the outskirts of a village. We chose Weston on the Green as a home because of his historic routes, near a Roman Settlement with acres of open countryside committed to keeping the countryside green at the landscape clear of human impact at nighttime. Weston on the green is a dark village, it doesn't have street lighting, the glare from the lights of this development at night will adversely impact our night time views and prevent us from using our telescope to view the stars.

We also object to this development because it is contrary to Cherwell's strategic aim of prioritising Knowledge Based business investment in this area. Hotel rooms at this development will only be available to Great Wolf resort guests. This will not assist the growth of other businesses in the areas providing employees with a place to stay overnight. Indeed The Great Wolf business model aims to keep all guests on site to use their restaurants, bowling alleys, retail shops etc so economic benefits will be retained by Great Wolf and not shared with local businesses in the local area. This means that there will be no shared economic benefit from this development.

Our local businesses, such as the two pubs in our village, are already finding it hard to recruit the employees Great Wolf will be targeting. As such, Great Wolf will either take employees away from local businesses which will have a negative economic impact, or they will bring in employees from other areas therefore increasing traffic movements. Either way, this will not benefit local people or businesses and add no value to the local economy.

Weston on the Green is a historic village with cottages, pubs and a manor house that goes back to the Norman times. The buildings in this environment are striking and Historic. The proposed development's scheme comprises of a total floor area of 500,000 sq. ft in two/three overbearing large blocks, not inkeeping with the local area at all. Schemes in such a location should be of small scale, detached buildings at low height (similar to the existing Golf Club), enhancing the character of the local area as outlined in Cherwell Council's Countryside Design Summary, 2008. The proposed design dues not meet these guidelines.

By its very nature, as a water resort this development will use an enormous amount of water from Cherwell's already short supply. Indeed Cherwell's own consultant (Tyrens) refers to the need to "reduce water demand in this highly water stressed area". The Thames Water Report supports only 50 of the 500 rooms can be supplied from the existing water supply. How will the huge use of water affect my family in Weston on the Green? We don't know because a study has not yet been done and there is no evidence to assure us that we will not be adversely impacted.

For all of these reasons i believe strongly that the Great Lakes development is a very poor design resulting in the wrong development, in an unsustainable location, with such limited benefits for the local economy and the risk of bringing a crippling impact to the local road network as to be unfeasible. I urge you to reject this application.

I would like to register my objection to the following: Great Lakes UK Ltd. Planning Application No. 19/02550/F Please find below an explanation of my objections to this proposed water resort.

I would like to object to the proposed development for a water park resort at Chesterton. I moved to the area 5 years ago. Since we moved into our house on the B430 at Weston on the Green, traffic on this road has risen by 40% according to parish council surveys of traffic. This level of increase has created noise and air pollution, and it has become markedly more difficult to get out of our little country lane during my morning commute. I am concerned that this increase is changing our village from the rural idyll we chose to move to only 5 years ago, and that the high speed HGVs that rattle through our village at night, making the floorboards in my home shake, are causing damage above and beyond the readily apparent harm caused to the road surface. Rat running HGVs and northbound traffic from the A34 cutting the corner of junction 9 to join the m40 at junction 10 are clearly impacting our quality of life. I anticipate that such negative impact will worsen further, unless planning permissions for municipal facilities are only agreed for locations which are fully accessible by public transport. As i explain further below, I do not believe the proposed Great Lakes development is sited in such a sustainable location.

The proposed development by Great Lakes is sited in an inappropriate location on the edge of a small village which has limited access via public transport or indeed any routes other than the B430. Approval of this development will result in huge increases in local traffic, negatively affecting local residents. Whilst it appears that the developer had modelled the impact of some 20% of their visitors arriving by car, this is far from the full picture. Even if 80% of visitors reach Bicester or Oxford by train, they will inevitably need to travel by road to the resort. Staff, deliveries, construction and visitor traffic will create a huge burden on already busy local roads. The developer's estimate of 1000 car journeys accessing the site per week seems plainly incompatible with their proposed visitor numbers.

The development includes 900 car parking spaces. We all know that families struggle to travel light, so i believe that it is much more likely that visitors to the site will rely on car travel. Families will not choose to use the train line into Bicester village (or Bicester North, or indeed Oxford Parkway); already packed commuter trains with no luggage compartments do not offer a practical means for a family to travel. Even if they do, they will then need to complete their journey by taxi or some other road-borne form of

transport. All of this will just result in more car users, this goes against the Cherwell Strategy of reducing car usage in the district. and points to an unsustainable location fit a family oriented resort.

The planning of other local developments at Kingsmere, Bicester Heritage and Bicester Gateway will all already increase traffic in the area, all using the A34/A41 access roads that are already struggling at peak times. To load these roads yet further will create problems, particularly in rush hour.

We moved to this area to be in the countryside. This development proposes 500,000 sq. ft of built form on what is currently a greenfield site irreversibly removing important green infrastructure and disrupting ecological habitats. This isn't what rural communities want to see done to their local environment. They want green fields, agricultural management and the fresh air that comes with open spaces on the outskirts of a village. We chose Weston on the Green as a home because of its rural environment, near a historic Roman Settlement with acres of open countryside committed to keeping the countryside green, and the landscape clear of human impact at nighttime. Weston on the Green is a dark village, it doesn't have street lighting, the glare from the lights of this development at night will adversely impact our night time views and prevent us from using our telescope to view the stars.

We also object to this development because it is contrary to Cherwell's stated strategic aim of prioritising Knowledge Based business investment in this area. Hotel rooms at this development will only be available to Great Wolf resort guests. This will not assist the growth of other businesses in the areas providing employees with a place to stay overnight. Indeed The Great Wolf business model aims to keep all guests on site to use their restaurants, bowling alleys, retail shops etc, so economic benefits will be retained by Great Wolf and not shared with local businesses in the local area. This means that there will be no locally shared economic benefit from this development.

Our local businesses, such as the two pubs in our village, are already finding it hard to recruit the employees Great Wolf will be targeting. As such, Great Wolf will either take employees away from local businesses which will have a negative impact on the economy and the community, or they will bring in employees from other areas therefore further increasing traffic movements. Either way, this will not benefit local people or businesses and add no value to the local economy.

Weston on the Green is an historic village with cottages, pubs and a manor house that goes back to the Norman times. The buildings in this environment are striking and Historic. The proposed development's scheme comprises of a total floor area of 500,000 sq. ft in two/three overbearing large blocks, not inkeeping with the local area at all. Schemes in such a location should be of small scale, detached buildings at low height (similar to the existing Golf Club), enhancing the character of the local area as outlined in Cherwell Council's Countryside Design Summary, 2008. The proposed design does not meet these quidelines.

By its very nature, as a water resort this development will use an enormous amount of water from Cherwell's already short supply. Indeed Cherwell's own consultant (Tyrens) has referred to the need to "reduce water demand in this highly water stressed area". The Thames Water Report supports only 50 of the 500 rooms can be supplied from the existing water supply. How will the huge use of water affect my family in Weston on the Green? We don't know because no study has been done and there is no evidence to assure us that we will not be adversely impacted.

For all of these reasons I strongly believe that the Great Lakes development is a very poor design resulting in the wrong development, in an unsustainable location, with a likely negative impacts on the local economy and community, and the plain risk of a crippling impact upon the local road network. For these reasons I believe it to be unfeasible. I urge you to reject this application.

I am writing to object very strongly to this application for a large-scale water theme park in the small village of Chesterton. It is totally out of keeping with the predominantly rural nature of this part of the District, would lead to significant transport issues in Chesterton and neighbouring villages, which are already past breaking point with excessive traffic and HGVs, and provide no benefit for the local communities. It is also not in keeping with the local development plan.

The site is currently a greenfield site and construction of this significant building would irreversibly remove important green space and disrupt ecological habitats for an abundance of wildlife. The proposed water tower would be the tallest building in Cherwell causing significant visual impairment while the proposed car park would rival the size of Bicester Village. The whole structure and design is totally out of keeping with the rural character of the local area, and with the Council's stated desire to tackle climate change.

As far as transport is concerned the existing road infrastructure cannot cope with the developments the Council has already approved (e.g. in Upper Heyford and on the outskirts of Bicester) with the result that traffic in Middleton Stoney is already gridlocked at certain times of the day and adding 1000+ daily car movements would just increase the air pollution and misery for local residents. It seems to me that the developers of the scheme have no real knowledge of local conditions nor any serious plans to deal with construction traffic (including both vans and HGVS). I think it inconceivable any Council concerned with climate change could approve such a scheme .

Economically the development will provide very little, if any, added benefit to local residents since the resort will not in any meaningful sense be open to the public, there will be little to no interaction with local businesses and the 600 lower skilled jobs it claims to provide are either likely to disrupt existing businesses or add significantly to traffic movements as new employees travel some distance.

In summary this is an unwanted proposal which is not in line with the local development plan, would be of significant detriment to the environment, aggravate considerably the transport problems already faced in all our villages, bring no benefits to local communities, and be an eyesore for miles around. I ask that the Planning Committee refuse the application in its entirety.

It has been brought to my attention that Great Lakes UK Ltd have applied to create an extensive holiday complex on the edge of Chesterton. Whereas there are many reasons why the application should be denied, perhaps the most significant factor is the resultant increase in road traffic.

A hotel of 500 family rooms will undoubtedly create far more traffic on an already overcrowded infrastructure. There will not only be traffic created by guests but also there will be staff, delivery and service vehicles. The A34 is legendary for being unfit for purpose and the A41, A4095 and B430 will be placed under further strain. Bicester Village alone breeds more than enough traffic for the town. Tesco, Bicester Avenue and The Premier Inn, together with ongoing housing development, have aggravated that situation and the new shopping complex shortly to be opened on the edge of the Kingsmere estate can only make matters even worse, especially if the proposed building of another hotel next to Tesco goes ahead.

Alchester Medical Practice are to relocate to Graven Hill. Patients from the North and West of Bicester and outlying villages such as Upper Heyford will add to the traffic flow trying to by-pass the town centre via the junction of the Oxford Road and the A41.

It strikes me that any objective analysis of this application can only conclude that it would be a betrayal by the Cherwell District Council of its responsibilities to existing residents and that it should be declined.



I write to object to the abovementioned planning application. Every aspect of it would appear to be strongly detrimental to citizens living in the surrounding area. Its sheer scale will have a disproportionate, adverse impact on the surrounding villages. It encompasses 500,000 square feet, it projects an extra 1000 car movements per day and anticipates employing 600 lower skilled staff.

The road system is already under severe stress and existing approved developments are seriously exacerbating the problem. The Middleton Stoney and its crossroad are already feeling the strain. In fairly short order the area has seen the approval of a quarry, an incinerator, the development at Upper Heyford, Kingsmere and the Eco town, the first stage of which, a large warehouse, is under construction. All these projects generate, and will generate, substantial traffic through a notorious pinch point in the centre of a small village. The last thing we need is a significant proportion of a projected 1000 daily vehicle movements through our village.

The proposed resort does not appear to confer any economic benefit on the area which has already has a labour shortage problem. The 600 low skilled workers will have to travel into area daily, increasing the traffic flow or else they will exacerbate the housing shortage, assuming they can afford to buy. It seems that the resort's marketing strategy is to encourage people to remain on site which, given the nature of the resort, is likely to be the case anyway so there is no spin off to local shops and pubs etc. In fact because of the traffic the economic effect will be detrimental. The project appears to run counter to the aims professed by all political parties namely to address the housing shortage and improve the environment. This resort can hardly be more environmentally friendly that the existing golf course.

This project will significantly degrade the quality of life in the surrounding communities whilst conferring no benefits them. I ask that planning approval be denied for this application.

Please record my strong objection to this scheme which is unsustainable and not in keeping with the local plan, my objections include but are not limited to the points below: 1. This is the wrong development in the wrong place, it would be better sited on brown field land with appropriate sustainable local resources, the planned site is green field on the edge of a village with already overloaded minor rat run roadways and continuous traffic issues even before the other planning activities such as BSA and the Gateway Warehouse on Howes Lane add further stress. Adding on the further traffic stresses of this developments scale as stated in their proposal is unacceptable. No one who has any knowledge of the reality of the local traffic issues already in place could claim this impact will be minimal. These traffic issues are subject to continuous attempts at revision to relieve the issues with little success seen so far in improving the traffic e.g. j9, j10, A41 into Bicester. Roads are already in poor state of repair due to excessive and heavy traffic movement. 2. You have a stated strategy of reducing car usage, this scheme will increase car movements as follows; current users of the 18 hole golf course travelling further distances to find a suitable alternative; 900 parking spaces on site - the identified need for provision of quests cars with short stays of just over 2 days meaning frequent turnover and the additional employee traffic having to travel in every day due to a lack local accommodation. 3. The site is greenfield with diverse wildlife on site proving a green area of relief from all the expansion seen already in the village and around Bicester, replacing this with 500k sq ft of tarmac and buildings is not a sustainable replacement. The proposal with take two years to develop how much wildlife will survive that length of disruption? 4. The area lacks sustainable local people resources with employers struggling to recruit retail and or leisure type roles, these jobs are generally lower paid and with no onsite accommodation the development will either increase current issues for employers in finding staff by cannibalising the existing employee pool and thus negatively impact the economy or attract staff from areas with lower houses costs which will increase driving distances from areas with more reasonable housing costs. 5. The Cherwell employment strategy is for knowledge jobs which as stated above this development will not provide in any significant proportion. 6. The ripple effect to the local economy is doubtful as the resort is set up as a one stop destination and the need for guests to leave site will be low. 7. In order to place the oversized development on the land available the developers have had to take an inefficient and less sustainable design approach. The design height has been set to try and minimise sight lines and thus sprawls over the site, urbanising most of the land envelope. 8. I object to this applicat5ion for large scale water park in the small village of Chesterton and can see no reason or argument as to why the developer would choose to build it in this vicinity. The proposal is not in accordance with the councils own local development plan and see no reason why planning permission should be agreed. Increase traffic is a main area of concern with the plan noting that 500,000 visitors per annum are expected with no specific 'change-over' day to limit vehicle movements. Personal transport traffic is apparently to be routed via specific routes but at the present time ALL routes in and around the proposed development are over crowded as it is - ie. A34 (regular RTIs and queuing traffic), M40 (regular tailbacks at both J9 and J10), A4095 (already large volume of traffic along this northern edge of Chesterton & B430 (already is a 'rat run' between the A34 and M40 J10). On top the of these obvious traffic issues it should also be noted that with the proposed development being built over the top of nine holes of the Chesterton Golf & Country Club traffic movements will also be increased as golfers take to other courses in order to play a full round. Already in and around Bicester and Chesterton due to large scale recent housing and retail developments traffic has increased significantly - this proposed water park will just increase pressure on an already overloaded roads infrastructure. The proposed site for the development is greenfield, a massive development of the nature proposed will adversely effect local wildlife habitat and ecosystem. In these days of increased environmental awareness surely we should not be allowing large scale destruction of nature in this way? It is difficult to imagine what economic benefit the proposed development would bring to the local area and goes against Cherwell DCs own prioritising of 'knowledge based' development. In and around Bicester businesses already find it difficult to recruit personnel, especially at the low income end of the jobs market which the proposed development may provide. This being the case the question remains of who exactly will work at the new development, where will employees come from and when sourced from outside the local community what is the benefit locally? Answer - very little benefit to the local community and town. With the huge potential visitor impact (possibly turning over 2000 visitors per day) a more suitable site should have been sourced in proper consultation with CDC. The developer has said that 'day passes' may be available to local residents to make use of the water park facilities, however, this is wholly dependent on poor hotel occupancy which obviously is not in the developers plans. With local residents pretty much barred from using the water park without booking a hotel room what is the benefit to having it? Once again, I strongly object to this out of scale, disruptive, destructive, unwanted and unneeded development and ask that it is refused. I am very concerned about the impact that this proposed development would have on the surrounding area and the huge increase in traffic it would generate, both during construction and then once it is running.

I understand that a 500 room hotel is planned, with a 900 space car park. I am not sure if access to this planned development would be off Akeman Street or the A4095, but Akeman Street is a narrow country lane and the A4095 has a number of bends between the motorway bridge and Chesterton, so neither is at all suitable for entry to such a large complex.

North Oxfordshire has low unemployment, and I understand that there will be no provision for staff accommodation on site, so workers would have to travel in daily, and the construction lorries would add to the congestion in the surrounding villages.

Kirtlington already has many gravel and very large construction vehicles travelling through, presumably to Upper Heyford and to Bicester, where building seems neverending. We don't need any more lorries.

The A34/M40 access is very busy always and the queues build up back to the Islip turn. Cars then use a ratrun on the B4027 and the unclassified roads down to Weston on the Green, which need passing places for some of the way. Or they come up to Bletchington, down past my house in Kirtlington and then up through the village on the A4095. Some very large lorries do this, causing problems round the sharp bends and manoeuvring past the parked cars in Bletchington Road, Kirtlington.

I gather that this construction would occupy 9 holes of the existing 18 holes of the Chesterton Golf Club. Presumably this would mean the existing golfers would have to go elsewhere. Facilities such as this, once lost cannot be replaced.

I do feel that this is NOT a suitable site for such a development.

We wish to strongly object to this application for a large-scale water theme park in the small village of Chesterton adjacent to Weston On The Green. There is absolutely no need for such a development in this location, nor is it in line with the local development plan.

This is currently a valuable green-field site providing a healthy sporting facility, which will be lost to a vast, inappropriately sized concreted area with large uncharacteristic buildings for a small village. The 900-space car park indicates the anticipated huge volume of extra traffic that will be travelling to and from the site, bringing with it a substantial increase in noise pollution, not to mention a decrease in air quality and thereby potentially adding to the associated health issues currently being identified nationally.

This will be a private resort attracting a proposed 500,00 visitors, and their vehicles, per year into an area already suffering from severe traffic congestion issues on the M40, A34, A41, A4095 and B430. Sat navs will bring all the traffic from the M40 through the horrendously overloaded Junction 9 and down the A34 and through Weston On The Green despite the persuasive suggestion of the developer to pretend to control the traffic routing.

The infrastructure of the area will simply not be able to sustain this proposed development, to the detriment of thousands of local residents and businesses. The Conference facilities will also attract an unknown but substantial extra number of car movements and resulting congestion.

Economically, the development will provide very little benefit to the local area, which already has very low unemployment. Its requirement to employ 600 lower skilled staff will either attract employees away from existing local businesses (already struggling to find staff) or necessitate distanced new employees travelling into the site, thereby increasing car journeys further (there is no provision for staff accommodation on site). These low-skilled employment opportunities are also contrary to Cherwell District Council's strategic aim of prioritising knowledge-based investment as a priority.

This resort will not be open to the public. The possibility of being offered expensive day passes will be solely dependent upon poor hotel occupancy, which is obviously not in the developers' plans! The Great Wolf proposal is not in accordance with the local development plan and there are no material considerations that would warrant planning permission being granted.


The existing road infrastructure around Chesterton, Bicester and the surrounding villages will be unable to cope with the extra daily thousand-plus increase to traffic volume. The extra vehicles do not even take into account the required construction traffic, which will also be larger and heavier. Chesterton, itself, is already a 'Rat-Run' and experiences significant traffic congestion on a regular basis when issues arise on the M40 or A34.

Little Chesterton, a hamlet just outside Chesterton on a single-track road, is highly likely to used as the most direct path between Junction nine of the M40 and the Water Park facility. This road: already suffers from the wear and tear of increased traffic in the area; is awkward for bi-directional traffic; and will be very difficult to improve/upgrade. The proposal to provide road signs to direct traffic on selected, defined, routes will be impossible to guarantee that there will be no increased traffic through the hamlet. Satellite Navigation systems are almost certain to direct vehicles through Little Chesterton as this route is almost certain to be deemed the shortest, quickest and cheapest.

The proposal to direct traffic on routes already stressed through villages such as Ardley, Middletor. Stoney and Weston-on-the-Green is unacceptable. This proposal is to return the old A34 (now B430) to the dark days of this route pre the opening of the M40. Many of the roads in this area, being 60 MPH zones, are not fit for increased traffic levels; they are narrow in places, with blind bends, hidden entrances and over-grown verges and hedgerows. It can be seen on a daily basis that people who live away from this area have no appreciation for the area that they drive through, and, hence, do not drive appropriatel;

Increased traffic WILL bring with it a number of increases: pollution, both noise and vehicle emission; road degradation, pot-holes & verge collapse; and litter on the side of the roads. The blatant disregarding of rubbish is already an issue on local roads, and one that will be sure to increase in line with increased traffic volumes. Litter is a blight to the eyesight and a danger to wildlife, livestock and pets.

In short, this area is not suitable for the proposed Great Wolf development.

I am writing to express my objection to the Great Lakes planning application referenced above.

Having spent a lot of time visiting the exhibitions put on by Great Wolf resort and reading their literature, I cannot see their proposal is in any way in accordance with the local development plan and cannot see any considerations that would warrant planning permission being granted.

Even now, every day I find myself caught up in traffic. The road from Weston-on-the-Green to Ardley is just awful and there is no escape from it as every minor road is used as a 'rat run' meaning they become just as bad and places such as Chesterton are just awash with cars. Avoiding that route completely and heading towards Bicester and the queues are just as long, if not longer. How can it possibly make any sense at all to add a further 1000 plus cars to the small localised area every day?

From my knowledge of talking to some local businesses, none of them are in favour of the scheme. Great Wolf resorts claim they will bring economic benefits to the area – how exactly? It is well known their business model is to keep as many people on site utilising their own shops, restaurants etc. In fact one of their representatives actually told me this when trying to convince me there would be no problem with people 'swamping' Chesterton and they were unlikely to leave the complex.

The sheer size and design of the proposed complex is not in-keeping with the local area and certainly does not do anything to enhance the character of the area. In fact it will be the opposite with an irreversible impact on the local environment.

I understand that Cherwell's strategic aim is to priortise Knowledge based business investment, thereby offering employment supporting the 'Knowledge Economy' – from everything I have seen this proposal is contrary to that aim. To be totally frank I am absolutely staggered this proposal is even being considered, there are so many aspects to it that are totally inappropriate to the location of choice it is laughable. However, given the current circumstances that have moved me to write this letter, rather than laughable it is actually a very scary prospect.

Where to begin?!

Even now there are long tail backs every morning and evening all around Bicester, Chesterton, Weston-on-the-Green, Middleton Cheney all the way down to Ardley. It is impossible to get anywhere between certain hours as every road is already being used as a 'rat run'. Throughout the rest of the day, there is a steady flow of traffic, certainly from Weston-on-the-Green though to the Ardley Junction and all roads into and out of Bicester.

Adding another 1000+ journeys for visitors and staff is not sustainable, especially when you consider there is already a new very large housing estate being built close by, new shopping centre and further proposals, all of which will generate more daily traffic.

How does encouraging so many car journeys for what we were told was an average of a 1.5 day stay, fit in with the Cherwell Strategy of reducing car usage, let alone the pollution and fuel wastage of people being sat in traffic jams?

Despite reading all of the literature put out by Great Wolf Resort, I cannot see that the resort is going to provide an economic benefit to the local economy. They have openly stated they aim to keep guests on site and as such local businesses would not benefit, in fact given the daily traffic jams it may actually adversely affect them!

The environmental aspect of adding an area of 500,000 sq. ft. of buildings to a Greenfield site will be immense and irreversible. Surely there are areas of open land away from congested roads and small villages where suitable road infrastructure already exists or there is room to add dedicated routes for the resort.

It seems to me that thousands of people every day will have their daily lives affected in a negative way, in order that Great Wolf resorts can make a lot of money for themselves whilst trying to portray it will be good for the local businesses and economy. When I last checked the figures for the Bicester area it appeared the local economy is already doing well and actually struggles to fill the current vacancies available – so no doubt the staff required for the resort will be taken from the local businesses or be encouraged to come from further afield – even more car journeys.

I would encourage everyone involved in reviewing this application to drive around the areas concerned, especially mornings and late afternoons (even lunchtimes) and to fully consider just what this resort REALLY would bring to the local area. It is unsustainable, in an inappropriate location on the edge of a small historic village. The development includes a 900-space car park, indicating a significant reliance on car travel which goes against the Cherwell Strategy of reducing car usage. It will comprise 500,000 square feet of building on a greenfield site, irreversibly removing important green space and disrupting ecological habitats for an abundance of wildlife.

The existing road infrastructure cannot cope with the projected extra 1000+ daily car movements. Chesterton is already a 'rat-run' and experiences major congestion as an escape route during the many traffic issues on the M40 and A34. In addition to several other significant proposals approved in Bicester, its unacceptable routing plans via Middleton Stoney, Weston on the Green and Wendlebury, will seriously affect the already stressed A34, A41, A4095 and B430. This will also result in a significant deterioration in air quality and a substantial increase in noise pollution for local residents.

The design of the buildings is neither small scale nor detached and therefore not in keeping with the character of the local area.

> I wish to object strongly to the above-mentioned application on the grounds that this proposal is not in accordance with the local development plan, and there are no material considerations that would warrant planning permission being granted. I have outlined below the areas in which this development is unsuitable: 1. Sustainability The development is totally unsustainable being located in an inappropriate situation at the edge of a village. The proposal includes 900 car parking spaces indicating a significant reliance on car travel which goes against the Cherwell Strategy of reducing car usage. The 18-hole golf course users will have to drive to alternative 18 holes courses, contributing to increased car use. The site comprises 500,000 sq. ft of built form on what is currently a greenfield site irreversibly removing important green infrastructure and disrupting ecological habitats. 2. Landscape Impact The applicant is looking to put 500,000 sq. ft of buildings on this greenfield site which will have a significant and irreversible impact on the landscape and views of the site. 3. Traffic Impact The existing road infrastructure (and that of surrounding villages) can't cope with the extra 1000+ daily increase in traffic volume, plus construction traffic. Chesterton is already a 'rat-run' and experiences major traffic congestion as an escape route during the many traffic issues on M40 or A34. Unacceptable routing plans via already stressed routes ie. Middleton Stoney, Weston on the Green and Wendlebury. This proposal would also direct traffic onto the A34 which already encounters significant traffic problems. It adds to numerous other significant proposals that have been approved in Bicester recently (Kingsmere, Bicester Gateway, Bicester Heritage). The road networks cannot cope with this additional traffic and the proposal is in the wrong location. 4. I have three issues which I think will adversely affect the residents of Chesterton Bicester and surrounding villages IF this proposal is approved. a)Surface water drainage and increased risk of flooding b) Traffic c) Reduction of an environmentally friendly local amenity to be replaced by a less green facility not designed for local visitors (average stay 2.6 days) Surface Water I quote from the summary of the proposal dealing with this subject This will ensure that post development flows are no greater than the anticipated greenfield run-off rates. Easy to say but is it feasible, and is the existing run off rate, slow enough to prevent flooding in Wendlebury? Traffic Again I quote from the summary of the proposal dealing with this subject A signage strategy has been developed which will direct drivers onto appropriate routes to access the Site and, in particular, direct drivers to avoid passing through Chesterton when approach and leaving the Site. The use of modern day Sat Nav will ignore signed routes and lead visitors to the quickest direct route avoiding traffic, this will lead to vehicles accessing the proposed site through Little Chesterton , the Hale , Green Lane, and the village of Chesterton, these roads are just not suitable for even small amounts of extra traffic. The B 430 has two of the most dangerous cross roads (Akeman street and the A4095) both within a mile or two of the proposed entrance to the site. The M40 Motorway junctions at 9 and 10 are simply not designed well enough to cope with the volume of traffic now using them (despite recent alterations) At junction 10 the north bound traffic has to cross traffic coming off the North bound carriageway to use the Service area, which is on one side of the Motorway only, there is only one exit lane on the Southbound carriageway and this has to cross Northbound A43 traffic and Southbound A43 traffic. The A43 being the main trunk route from the M1 and onward via the M40 to West London or to the A34 bound for the South Coast and the major Ports of Southampton and Portsmouth. Junction 9 is prone to Gridlock due to the short distance between the traffic lights and the volume of traffic trying to get up and down the A34, when this happens more traffic finds its way onto the B430 taking a detour through Chesterton or continuing through Middleton Stoney. The A34 is already notorious for traffic jams accidents and delays. As well as being major trunk routes between the North and the South there are already major attractions using the exits at Junction 9 (Bicester Village, Blenheim Palace and Oxford) and Junction 10 (Silverstone, Stowe and the Service area). The proposal also envisages guests arriving by train, I think this unlikely as if travelling with children and luggage for two or three nights visitors are most likely to want the convenience of having their own transport. I think those responsible for approving this proposal need to have the traffic statistics independently verified because I fear that the assumptions that they have used to reach the conclusion that "With regard to the operation of the Proposed Development, it has been demonstrated that the Proposed Development is likely to result in a negligible (not significant) residual effect on the highway network local to the Site. " MAY NOT BE VALID.





I am directly affected by this, proposal, my property will suffer from noise, light and air pollution for at least 3 years during the construction phase. I reside 12 metres from the edge of the proposed car park development and only have a low level hawthorn hedge for screening. I will be afforded no privacy and once complete have to endure a view of a lit car park with the associated noise and afford no privacy to my family whatsoever.

To build on a beautiful nature rich site and destroy wildlife habitats makes no sense. We need to protect our green spaces not destroy them. Replacing hundreds of trees and many ponds with concrete is irresponsible and morally indefensible. There are so many brown field sites elsewhere that would gain a benefit, areas that are run down and in need of regeneration. It is incomprehensible that approval could be considered, to ruin an established golf course and wildlife haven much loved by the local residents, to appease the financial ambitions of a large US company.

If Bicester Golf course reduces to 9 holes, this will only leave one 18-hole golf course in the Bicester area. With reference to the 2018 sports studies, Bicester currently has the lowest number of golf holes in the district per 1000 population. With the increase in population in the area through to 2031 and England Golfs aims to increase golf participation, increase number of members in clubs and the

strengthening of clubs, the future golf provision in Bicester is showing a shortfall. The recommendation is that existing golf sites should be protected and that positive planning policies are adopted to enable the development of new golf provision. It is recommended Bicester will require an additional 18 hole or 2 x 9 hole golf course. The clubs has already seen a huge drop in membership as a result of the proposal and should planning approval be granted the 9 hole course would be unsustainable. The fear would be that the front 9 holes would then be ripe for further development of great Wolf UK Ltd

It is a fact that this proposal would damage the surrounding small villages. These villages would feel the strain of massively increase traffic flows, with increased pollution and the inevitable increase in accidents rates. Chesterton is already busy at peak times and experiences major traffic congestion as an escape route during the regular issues that affect the M40 and A34. The residents of the village will be subjected to intolerable disruption during the construction phase a projected 31000 deliveries equal 65 daily deliveries plus 2000 construction workers commuting to site daily through Chesterton, Weston on the Green, Middleton Stoney and Kirtlington. This will produce unacceptable levels of noise and traffic disruption and the associated pollution that this will inevitably bring. Once completed there would be in excess of 1800 traffic movements a day. Great wolf purport to mitigate this traffic by signage, yet the only way in to the resort is through the above villages and a Sat Nav would take traffic through other small Hamlets including little Chesterton when traffic as it inevitably will be is bad.

The area suffers from poor infrastructure and cannot cope with the existing levels of traffic. Proposals are underway for a David Lloyd Health club, a large sporting complex adjacent to the Golf Club and potential expansion of the residential development at Penrose Gardens off green Lane. Already underway are the developments at Kingsmere, on both sides of the A430 including the axis 19 distribution units opposite, a Hoilday Inn on the a 430 and A41 roundabout, retail outlets on the A41, the Gravenhill development and other Residential developments scattered around the Bicester ring. All of this is already producing significant traffic issues, this is set to deteriorate further once construction is completed. With an anticipated 1800 great wolf movements a day following this proposal, it is clear that it would b unsustainable. The Council will be left with a legacy of issues including traffic control and calming measures being required all at taxpayers' expense. Chesterton is creaking at the seams and does not want or need this development.

Chesterton is an historic village and this development is not only out of character but in contravention of the Cherwell Local plan. Visually, it would be a monstrosity, looming over the surrounding countryside comprising; A 4 storey, 500 family rooms hotel with An 84 foot high water tower which is likely to be the tallest building in Cherwell. A 900 space floodlit car park. There are so many brown field sites more suited to this kind of development in parts of the country that need economic stimulus.

This ill-conceived proposal lacks justification on every level, it is the wrong development in the wrong place at the wrong time. in short, it would be an environmental catastrophe that that residents would have to endure for generations. There is no demand in the local area for a water park. Any benefit would clearly go to Great Lakes Uk and their US parent company Great Wolf Resorts. I urge the council to standby their strict guidelines and policies when considering this proposal and refuse planning.

As a family member of relatives living in Chesterton, I am a regular visitor and I enjoy seeing surrounding villages and green footpaths over fields. I consider the Wolf project to be unacceptable in size which will have a negative impact on the wildlife and countryside. It will be dangerous for local pedestrians because of the narrow footpaths. The extra traffic which this proposal would generate would put serious strain on the local lanes, many of which have no footpaths, which feed various villages. The additional noise and pollution would be unbearable.

There is very little unemployment in Bicester, so staff at the proposed Water Park would drive to work, thus overcrowding poorly maintained local roads and making it unsafe for children to cross the main road through Chesterton Village.

The government's recent decision to expand Heathrow Airport has been ruled 'unlawful' by the Court of Appeal because it falls foul of the Paris Accord on the agreement within the **United Nations Framework Convention on Climate Change**. I feel that this is worth mentioning to you because I believe it is another good reason to object to the Planning Application submitted by The Great Wolf Resorts for a hotel and Waterpark on part of the site on the Chesterton golf Course.

This application if successful could result in **an extra 1800 vehicles A DAY** clogging the already over-crowded A34, A41, M40, A40, A4095 and surrounding roads. Plans include car parking for 900 cars which is only marginally less vehicles than those accommodated in **the 1000 space Westgate Carpark**, resulting in a substantial increase in air and noise pollution – recent scientific research links traffic pollution in particular to a number of health conditions such as asthma. The traffic chaos will cause substantial pollution and damage to a large swathe of historic villages, green belt and natural habitat for wildlife, year-round. The footprint of the new complex will be **60 per cent larger than Bicester Village shopping centre**.

It is also worth pointing out that this isn't a local amenity, because to use the facilities, most guests would need to book an overnight room at the four-storey hotel complex, with its capacity for around 2000 guests a night. The business model is based on near full-occupancy with guests intended to stay on site to use facilities. This means few day passes available for local families, particularly during popular school holidays as stated by GWR themselves on EVERY site of EVERY Great Wolf Resort across the US. Great Wolf Resorts have made little effort to spell this out to residents of the surrounding villages and the town of Bicester. It is also worth noting that nowhere on their site could I find a resort in an area comparable to Chesterton most of them being built adjacent to big freeways not small rural locations.

In addition there will be little or no 'trickle down' benefit to local businesses as customers will stay at the hotel and use bars, shops, restaurants on site before returning home. There are currently very low unemployment levels in the types of jobs to be offered by GW (bar staff, cleaners, waiters) Many restaurants and pubs already struggle to fill these vacancies so competition with the Great Wolf Lodge will make staffing issues even more problematic.

How can this development be part of a genuine 'need' in the area? It surely doesn't come under the banner of 'need', not being a hospital, Community Centre, library, Police Station or indeed anything that is required for the genuine need of the community. How can three Wolf Resorts prove 'need'?

I whole-heartedly object to this application for a large-scale water theme park in the small village of Chesterton. There is absolutely no need for such a development in this location, nor is it in line with the local development plan.

This is currently a stunning greenfield site providing a healthy sporting facility, which will be lost to a vast, inappropriately sized concreted area with large uncharacteristic buildings for a small village. The 900-space car park indicates the anticipated huge volume of extra traffic that will be travelling to and from the site, bringing with it a substantial increase in noise pollution, not to mention a decrease in air quality and the potentially adding to the associated health issues currently being identified nationally.

This will be a private resort attracting a proposed 500,00 visitors, and their vehicles, annually into an area already suffering from severe traffic congestion issues on the M40, A34, A41, A4095 and B430. The infrastructure of the area will simply not be able to sustain this proposed development, to the detriment of thousands of local residents and businesses. The Conference facilities will also attract an unknown but substantial extra number of car movements and resulting congestion.

Economically, the development will provide very little benefit to the local area, which already has very low unemployment. It's requirement to employ 600 lower skilled staff will either attract employees away from existing local businesses (already struggling to find staff) or necessitate distanced new employees travelling into the site, thereby increasing car journeys further. (There is no provision for staff accommodation on site). These low-skilled employment opportunities are also contrary to Cherwell's strategic aim of prioritising knowledge-based investment as a priority

This resort will not be open to the public. The possibility of being offered expensive day passes will be solely dependent upon poor hotel occupancy, which is obviously not in the developers' plans! As the majority of guests are encouraged to stay and spend their money on site, there will be negligible economic benefit to the local hospitality industry.

Once again, I strongly object to this unwanted and unneeded proposal, completely out of keeping with its rural location, and ask that it be refused.

- 2. Need: this proposal is driven by speculative commercial opportunity not by any defined need. The location is not supported for such a substantial and significant use and departure from the current use. It is evident to anyone who knows the local area that the landowner is seeking to derive a windfall gain from this speculative development because of the failure to position and run the existing Bicester Hotel Golf & Spa as a successful business. It is not the job of the planning process to fund a poorly-performing business by consenting a speculative application which is neither supported by need nor policy.
- 3. Misrepresentative and misleading consultation: the applicant's pre-application has been poor. The design of the consultation questionnaire provided was misleading and inadequate. It included leading questions and was clearly designed to enable 'analysis' to be carried out which

skewed the results and sought to imply a greater percentage of respondents may be supportive. Why, for example, were there two boxes to tick for 'support' as well as one for 'neutral' while only one for 'do not support' unless the intention was to group 'neutral', 'support' and 'strongly support' together in order to imply a greater proportion of respondents are somehow supportive or not opposed? I have worked in the market research industry for many years and found the structure of the feedback form deeply concerning. I do not believe the applicant was committed to carrying out any meaningful or genuine consultation which I find deeply troubling. The purpose of preapplication consultation is to enable the opportunity to shape and improve the scheme through feedback – the applicant has not demonstrated any meaningful adjustment to the proposals.

The fundamentals of this application (namely site, the policy position for the site, its poor connectivity and therefore lack of sustainability, and need) all mean that **this application is not sustainable development**.

The harm it would create substantially outweighs any claimed benefit nor can this harm be mitigated or off-set.

Like many I have spoken to, I would like to see Cherwell DC refuse the application and to see Great Wolf Resorts find an appropriate site which is actually suited to the purpose and on which it can bring forward its investment and a scheme which could meet a sustainability assessment.

This application for this site is highly unsustainable and harmful and one cannot get away from the fact that it is fundamentally the wrong site for this proposed use and development.
