**Comments** 

The proposed developments seeks to opportunistically benefit from the popularity of warehousing/office/logistics in and around J9 and J10. None of the surrounding areas will benefits from such a development, so whilst business is important it cannot be to the expense of everyone else. With judgment comes responsibility and long term value comes from consensus of all parties. The impact on existing infrastructure will significantly impact local residents. The road network is currently running at full capacity without the added stress from logistics/industrial parks. Backed up traffic and the corresponding delays will have the effect of traffic looking for alternative routes and spilling into the B roads and single track roads increasing the risks to local residents, their family and local small family owned business as well as farming communities. The increase in traffic caused by HGV as well as HGV's themselves will increase pollution significantly as a result of emissions and microparticles released in to the environment.
